- February 20, 2019** **The Honorable Roy Cooper**, Governor will address the Sir Walter Cabinet
- March 5, 2019** **Dr. William R. Ferris**, the Joel R. Williamson Eminent Professor of History Emeritus at UNC-Chapel Hill and the senior associate director emeritus of its Center for the Study of the American South, is a widely recognized leader in Southern Studies, African American music and folklore.
- March 19, 2019** **Dr. Valerie Hillings is the first female director of the North Carolina Museum of Art.** After graduating from Duke University, Hillings earned a master's degree and Ph.D. in art history from New York's University's Institute of Fine Arts before landing at the Guggenheim Museum. She will share her vision of the N.C. Museum of Art.
