2	AN ACT TO PROVIDE FOR THE LICENSURE OF CREMATORY OPERATORS
3	AND TO ESTABLISH THE CREMATORY AUTHORITY WITHIN THE BOARD
4	OF MORTUARY SCIENCE.
5	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:
6	Section 1. Chapter 90 of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new
7	Article to read:

11	This Article shall be known and may be cited as the North Carolina Crematory Act.
12	" <u>§ 89-210.41. Definitions.</u>
13	As used in this Article, unless the context requires otherwise:
14	(1) 'Authorizing agent' means a person legally entitled to order the
15	cremation of human remains. An authorizing agent shall be, in order
16	of preference, a spouse, an adult child, a parent, any adult sibling,
17	guardian or close relation of the deceased. In the case of indigents or
18	any other individuals whose final disposition is the responsibility of
19	the State, a public official charged with arranging the final disposition
20	of the deceased, if legally authorized, may serve as the authorizing
21	agent. In the case of individuals who have donated their bodies to
22	science, or whose death occurred in a nursing home or other private
23	institution, and in which the institution is charged with making

1		arrangements for the final disposition of the deceased, a representative
2		of the institution, if legally authorized, may serve as the authorizing

2	the provisions of this Article and Chapter 150B of the General Statutes, to subpoena
3	witnesses, and to administer oaths or to receive the affirmation of witnesses before the
4	Crematory Authority.
5	(f) The Crematory Authority shall enforce the rules adopted by it pursuant to this
6	<u>Article.</u>
7	(g) The Crematory Authority shall select from its members a chairman, a vice
8	chairman and a secretary who shall serve for one year or until their successors are
9	elected and qualified. No two offices may be held by the same person. The Crematory
10	Authority, with the concurrence of the Board of Mortuary Science, shall have the
11	authority to engage adequate staff as deemed necessary to perform its duties.
12	(h) <u>The Crematory Authority shall adopt a common seal.</u>
13	(i) The members of the Crematory Authority, before entering upon their duties,
14	shall take and subscribe to the oath of office prescribed for other State officers, which
15	said oath shall be administered by a person qualified to administer such oath and shall
16	be filed in the Office of the Secretary of State.
17	(j) The Crematory Authority shall hold at least one meeting in each year. In
18	addition, the Crematory Authority may meet as often as the proper and efficient
19 20	discharge of its duties shall require. Five members shall constitute a quorum.
20	" <u>§ 90-210.43. Licensing and inspection.</u>
21	(a) Any person doing business in this State, or any cemetery, funeral
22	establishment, corporation, partnership, joint venture, voluntary organization or any
23 24	other entity may erect, maintain and conduct a crematory in this State and provide the
24 25	necessary appliances and facilities for the cremation of human remains in accordance
23 26	with the provisions of this Article and the rules and regulations adopted by the
20 27	<u>Crematory Authority.</u> (b) A crematory may be constructed on or adjacent to any cemetery, on or
27	adjacent to any funeral establishment that is zoned commercial or industrial, or at any
28 29	other location consistent with local zoning regulations.
30	(c) <u>Application for license as a crematory operator shall be on forms furnished</u>
31	and prescribed by the Crematory Authority. The Crematory Authority shall examine
32	the premises and structure to be used as a crematory, and shall issue a license to the
33	crematory operator if the applicant meets all the requirements of this Article and of any
34	rules and regulations adopted by the Crematory Authority. In the event of any change
35	of ownership of a crematory, at least 30 days prior to the change, the new owners of the
36	crematory shall provide the Crematory Authority with their names and addresses.
37	(d) Every application shall identify the individual who is responsible for
38	overseeing the management and operation of the crematory. The Crematory Authority
39	may establish standards which the manager must meet. The crematory operator shall
40	keep the Crematory Authority informed at all times of the name and address of the
41	manager.
42	(e) No person, cemetery, funeral establishment, corporation, partnership, joint
43	venture, voluntary organization or any other entity shall cremate any human remains,

27	<u>(9)</u>	Indecent exposure or exhibition of a dead human body while in the
28		custody or control of a licensee.

4	(b) No unauthorized person shall be permitted in the crematory area while any
5	human remains are in the crematory area awaiting cremation, being cremated, or being
6	removed from the cremation chamber. Relatives of the deceased, the authorizing agent,
7	medical examiners and law enforcement officers in the execution of their duties shall be
8	authorized to have access to the holding facility and crematory facility.
9	(c) The simultaneous cremation of the human remains of more than one person
10	within the same cremation chamber is forbidden.
11	" <u>§ 90-210.46. Disposition of cremated remains.</u>
12	(a) The authorizing agent shall provide the person with whom cremation
13	arrangements are made with a signed statement specifying the ultimate disposition of
14	the cremated remains, if known. A copy of this statement shall be retained by the
15	crematory operator.
16	(b) The authorizing agent is responsible for the disposition of the cremated
17	remains. If, after a period of 30 days from the date of cremation, the authorizing agent
18	or his representative has not specified the ultimate disposition or claimed the cremated
19	remains, the crematory operator or the person in possession of the cremated remains
20	may dispose of the cremated remains. The authorizing agent shall be responsible for
21	reimbursing the crematory operator for all reasonable expenses incurred in disposing of
22	the cremated remains pursuant to this section. A record of such disposition shall be
23	made and kept by the person making such disposition. Upon disposing of cremated
24	remains in accordance with such section, the crematory operator or person in possession
25	of the cremated remains shall be discharged from any legal obligation or liability
26	concerning such cremated remains. This provision shall apply to all cremated remains
27	currently in the possession of a crematory operator or other party.
28	(c) In addition to disposing of cremated remains in a crypt, niche, grave, or
29	scattering garden located in a dedicated cemetery, or by scattering over uninhabited
30	public land, the sea or other public waterways pursuant to subsection (f) of this section,
31	cremated remains may be disposed of in any manner on the private property of a
32	consenting owner, upon direction of the authorizing agent. If cremated remains are to
33	be disposed of by the crematory operator on private property, other than dedicated
34	cemetery property, the authorizing agent shall provide the crematory operator with the
35	written consent of the property owner.
36	(d) Except with the express written permission of the authorizing agent no person
37	$\underline{\text{may:}}$
38	(1) Dispose of or scatter cremated remains in such a manner or in such a
39 40	location that the cremated remains are commingled with those of
40	another person. This subdivision shall not apply to the scattering of aromated remains at sea or by air from individual aloged containers or
41 42	cremated remains at sea or by air from individual closed containers or to the scattering of cremated remains in an area located in a dedicated

1 2 3	(2) Place cremated remains of more than one person in the same closed container. This subdivision shall not apply to placing the cremated remains of members of the same family in a common closed container
4	designed for the cremated remains of more than one person.
5 6	(e) <u>Cremated remains shall be delivered by the crematory operator to the</u> individual specified by the authorizing agent on the cremation authorization form. The
0 7	representative of the crematory operator and the individual receiving the cremated
8	remains shall sign a receipt indicating the name of the deceased, and the date, time, and
9	place of the receipt. After this delivery, the cremated remains may be transported in any
10	manner in this State, without a permit, and disposed of in accordance with the
11	provisions of this Article.
12	(f) Cremated remains may be scattered over uninhabited public land, a public
13	waterway or sea, subject to health and environmental standards, or on the private
14	property of a consenting owner pursuant to subsection (c) of this section. A person may
15	utilize a boat or airplane to perform such scattering. Cremated remains shall be
16	removed from their closed container before they are scattered.
17	" <u>§ 90-210.47. Liability.</u>
18	(a) Any person signing a cremation authorization form shall be deemed to
19	warrant the truthfulness of any facts set forth in the cremation authorization form,
20	including the identity of the deceased whose remains are sought to be cremated and that
21	person's authority to order such cremation. Any person signing a cremation
22	authorization form shall be personally and individually liable for all damage occasioned
23	thereby and resulting therefrom.
24	(b) A crematory operator shall have authority to cremate human remains upon
25	the receipt of a cremation authorization form signed by an authorizing agent. There
26	shall be no liability of a crematory operator which cremates human remains pursuant to
27	such authorization, or which releases or disposes of the cremated remains pursuant to
28	such authorization.
29	(c) <u>A crematory operator shall not be responsible or liable for any valuables</u>
30	delivered to the crematory operator with human remains.
31	(d) <u>A crematory operator shall not be liable for refusing to accept a body or to</u>
32	perform a cremation until it receives a court order or other suitable confirmation that a
33 34	<u>dispute has been settled if:</u>
34 35	 (1) It is aware of any dispute concerning the cremation of human remains, (2) It has a reasonable basis for questioning any of the representations
35 36	made by the authorizing agent, or
30 37	(3) For any other lawful reason.
38	(e) If a crematory operator is aware of any dispute concerning the release or
<u>39</u>	disposition of the cremated remains, the crematory operator may refuse to release the
40	cremated remains until the dispute has been resolved or the crematory operator has been
41	provided with a court order authorizing the release or disposition of the cremated
42	remains. A crematory operator shall not be liable for refusing to release or dispose of
43	cremated remains in accordance with this subsection.

1	(a) The crematory authority may set and collect fees not to exceed the following
2	amounts from licensed crematory operators and applicants:
3	(1) Licensee application fee. \$400.00
4	(2) Annual renewal fee. 150.00
5	(3) Late renewal penalty. 75.00
6	(4) <u>Re-inspection fee.</u> 100.00
7	(5) Per cremation fee. 10.00
8	(b) The funds collected pursuant to this Chapter shall become part of the general
9	fund of the Board of Mortuary Science. The cost of the maintenance of the Crematory
10	Authority shall be deemed a general expense of the Board of Mortuary Science. The
11	Board shall keep an accurate accounting of all the receipts and expenditures made
12	pursuant to this Article and shall provide a current report of such to the Crematory
13	Authority bi-annually.
14	" <u>§ 90-210.49. Crematory operator authority.</u>
15	(a) <u>A crematory operator may employ a licensed funeral director for the purpose</u>
16	of arranging cremations with the general public, transporting human remains to the
17	crematory, and processing all necessary paper work. Nothing in this provision may be
18	construed to require a licensed funeral director to perform any functions not otherwise
19	required by law to be performed by a licensed funeral director.
20	(b) <u>A crematory operator may enact reasonable rules consistent with this Article</u>
21	for the management and operation of a crematory. Nothing in this subsection may be
22	construed to prevent a crematory operator from adopting rules which are more stringent
23	than the provisions of this Article.
24	(c) Nothing in this Chapter shall prohibit or require the performance of
25	cremations by crematory operators for or directly with the public, or exclusively for or
26	through licensed funeral directors.
27	(d) Nothing in this Article may be construed to prohibit a crematory operator
28	from transporting human remains.
29	"§ 90-210.50. Applicability, violations, and prohibitions of Article.
30	(a) Not later than January 1, 1990, every crematory being operated in this State
31	shall apply for and be qualified to obtain a license under this Article in order to continue
32	operation.
33	(b) The provisions of this Article shall not apply to the cremation of human
34	remains and medical waste performed by or for the North Carolina Anatomical
35	Commission, licensed hospitals and medical schools, and the office of the Chief
36	Medical Examiner when the disposition of such human remains and medical waste is
37	the legal responsibility of said institutions.
38	(c) <u>A violation of any of the provisions of this Chapter is hereby declared to be a</u>
39 40	misdemeanor punishable by imprisonment for up to six months and a fine up to one thousand dollars (\$1,000)
40	thousand dollars (\$1,000).
41	(d) No person, firm, or corporation may request or authorize cremation or
42	cremate a dead human body when he has information indicating a crime or violence of
43	any sort in connection with the cause of death unless such information has been
