- Each project plan shall include strategies for the coordination of <u>(7)</u> education goals with State accreditation standards and methods to meet or exceed the student performance standards contained in those accreditation standards.

(d) Approval.

10 11 12 (1) The Superintendent of Public Instruction shall appoint a State School-Based Accountability and Flexibility Project advisory council to establish and monitor rules for the submission and approval of grants under this section.

(2) The advisory council shall include teachers, administrators, and local school board members selected by their constituent education organizations. Currently employed teachers shall compose a majority of the council membership.

(3) In the first year of implementation of this section, the deadline for applications submitted by local school administrative units shall be September 1 of the school year for which they are proposed. The State School-Based Accountability and Flexibility Project advisory council shall review all applications for 1989-90 and shall approve or reject them no later than November 1 of the school year for which they are to be implemented. Thereafter, the respective application deadlines shall be June 1 and August 1.

Evaluation. Each project school and local school administrative unit shall conduct an annual evaluation of their project. The Department of Public Instruction, with the assistance of the State School-Based Accountability and Flexibility Project advisory council, shall be responsible for collecting and compiling a comprehensive evaluation of all local school administrative unit projects under this section and shall report its findings to the General Assembly.



School Councils. (a)

Each school, by majority vote of the faculty of the school and (1) concurrence of the principal, may apply to the local school administrative unit council to be a school-based accountability project 36 37 school. A school council shall be established in each project school 38 which shall adopt operating procedures concerning such matters as 39 council agenda, meeting schedules, staff communications, and modes of decision-making. The operating procedures for the school council 40 41 shall be submitted to the local school administrative unit council for 42 approval and, upon approval, the school council shall adopt the 43 procedures. The school council shall meet regularly to address and 44 decide on such matters as: educational goals; school organization and



- 1 (5) Review for approval, and monitor approved school council operating procedures;
 - (6) Serve as a review panel on matters appealed from local school councils; and
 - (7) Conduct a vote of project school faculty of the local school administrative unit no later than June 15 of each school year in order to determine if the project is to be continued or discontinued.
 - (c) Schools or local school administrative units may not adopt procedures, make decisions, or take any action which abrogates the rights of school employees, students, or parents of students, provided by law, by the North Carolina Constitution or by the United States Constitution.
 - (d) Schools or local school administrative units may not adopt procedures, make decisions, or take any action which is in conflict with the provisions of North Carolina law, except where waivers or other suspension of the provisions of North Carolina law are applicable and have been granted. Educators who participate in the school-based accountability and flexibility project may not be subjected to reprisals of any kind as a result of actions, statements, or positions arising from their participation or failure to participate in the project.
 - (e) State funds allocated to local school administrative units for staff development shall be used by the local school administrative units to provide staff orientation to school-based accountability and flexibility projects."
 - Sec. 2. There is appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of Public Education the sum of six million dollars (\$6,000,000) for the 1989-90 fiscal year, and the sum of twelve million dollars (\$12,000,000) for the 1990-91 fiscal year, to be allocated to local school administrative units that establish school-based accountability and flexibility projects. Allocations to the local school administrative units shall be made pro rata based upon the number of educators within each local school administrative unit.
 - Sec. 3. This act shall become effective July 1, 1989.
