2 AN ACT TO ESTABLISH A COMPUTERIZED CENTRAL VOTER REGISTRATION SYSTEM.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

Section 1. Chapter 163 of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new Article to read:

"ARTICLE 7A.

"COMPUTERIZED CENTRAL VOTER REGISTRATION.

"§ 163-83. Establishment.

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The Secretary of State shall develop and implement a statewide computerized voter registration system to facilitate voter registration and to provide a central data base containing voter registration information for each county. The system shall encompass both software development and purchasing of the necessary hardware for the central and online systems. The Secretary of State shall be responsible for maintaining the centralized voter registration system and for supplying all necessary election day materials relating to voter registration confirmation to the county boards of election.

County boards of election shall be responsible for the registering of voters within their county within the guidelines established by law. Each county board of election shall have direct online access to the central system with the ability to add, change and delete records relating to their county. The county boards shall maintain a duplicate registration file until such time as it is determined that a county's voter registration files and records have been completely converted to the statewide system.

"§ 163-83.1. Promulgation of rules and regulations relating to voter registration.

- 1 (a) The Secretary of State shall make all necessary rules required to administer
 2 the central voter registration system. These rules shall include:
 3 (1) Provisions for voters to submit an approved voter registration form to
 - (1) Provisions for voters to submit an approved voter registration form to any of the following:
 - a. Board of elections in county of residence;
 - <u>b.</u> Any public library or branch public library in county of residence;
 - c. All high schools in the county of residence (only for students attending the high school);
 - d. <u>Drivers license renewal and license tag renewal offices of the Department of Motor Vehicles; and</u>
 - e. Through the mail using postcard registration.
 - (2) Provisions for the establishment, development, and maintenance of a computerized central voter registration file including any and all provisions for accessing, inputing, and outputing data in the central voter registration system file with provisions for each county to identify the precinct to which a voter should be assigned for voting purposes;
 - (3) Provisions for possible interaction with the computerized drivers license records of the Division of Motor Vehicles;
 - (4) Provisions for full protection and security of the data with monitoring to ensure against unauthorized entry; and
 - (5) Provisions for the phasing in and converting of current voter registration records at the county level to the central voter registration system.
 - (b) To the extent that rules adopted under this Article conflict with Article 7 of this Chapter, the rules shall prevail.

"§ 163-83.2. Voter Registration Commission.

- (a) There is established a Voter Registration Commission within the Office of Secretary of State to oversee the voter registration process and to make recommendations concerning changes in the election laws. The Commission shall have three members: the Secretary of State who shall serve as chairman and the chairmen, or their designees, of the two political parties having the highest voter registration in this State.
- (b) Beginning January 1, 1991, the Voter Registration Commission in consultation with the county boards of elections shall submit a biennial report to the General Assembly concerning the status of the centralized voter registration system. This report shall also contain any recommendations by the Voter Registration Commission as to election law modifications relating to the full implementation of the centralized voter registration system.

"§ 163-83.3. Voter awareness and outreach programs.

The Secretary of State shall establish plans for encouraging voter awareness and voter registration in North Carolina. Outreach programs shall be developed and

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conducted periodically throughout the State. These outreach programs should incorporate, but not be limited to, the following methods:

- (1) Signs, posters, brochures, informational pamphlets, and media promotions designed to increase and encourage voter awareness and registration;
- (2) Use of a toll-free number to provide information on how, when, where, and procedures for registering to vote and voting; and
- (3) Use of annual election essay and slogan contests for grades 9-12 with scholarship offerings for various sponsoring organizations to winners and runners-up.

The Secretary of State shall report his efforts concerning the outreach program and the development of scholarship sponsorships to the election laws committees of the General Assembly annually beginning in 1990. The first report shall be presented to the 1990 Session of the North Carolina General Assembly.

"§ 163-83.4. Drivers license and identification card applications.

The Division of Motor Vehicles shall change its applications for an original, duplicate, or change of address of drivers licenses or special identification cards so that the forms may also serve as voter registration cards. The forms must contain spaces for the information required to process the forms for voter registration and conform to the applicable rules of the Secretary of State. Applicants for drivers licenses or identification cards, or those appearing for renewal or change of address must be asked if they want to register to vote at the same time. A copy of each application containing a completed voter registration must be sent by the end of the working week to the county board of elections of the county in which the voter maintains residence.

The computerized drivers license and special identification card record information relating to name, address, date of birth, drivers license number, county, town, and city must be made available for access by the county boards of election and the Secretary of State for interaction with the central voter registration system.

"§ 163-83.5. Close of registration files.

Until the end of the seventh working day before an election, any individual who is eligible to vote may register in person by completing under oath a registration card at one of the designated locations in the county of residence, in the form prescribed by the Secretary of State, and providing proof of residence. Registration by mail will be accepted if postmarked by the 10th working day before an election. An individual may prove residence for the purpose of registering by:

- (1) Showing a drivers license or special identification card issued by the Division of Motor Vehicles;
- (2) Showing any document approved by the Secretary of State as proper identification; or
- (3) Having a voter who is registered to vote in the precinct sign an oath in the presence of the election judge vouching that the voter personally knows that the individual is a resident of the precinct. Anyone signing a false oath shall be guilty of a general misdemeanor. A voter who has

	been vouched for on election day may not sign a proof of residence
2	oath vouching for any other individual on that election day."
