                Sec. 2. G.S. 7A-68(a) reads as rewritten:

"(a) Each district attorney shall be entitled to <u>at least</u> one administrative assistant to be appointed by the district attorney and to serve at his pleasure. The assistant need not be an attorney licensed to practice law in the State of North Carolina."

Sec. 3. G.S. 7A-69 reads as rewritten:

^{44 &}quot;§ 7A-69. Investigatorial assistants.

The district attorney in the third-B, fourth, seventh, tenth, eleventh, twelfth, fourteenth, fifteenth-A, sixteenth, eighteenth, twentieth, twenty-first, twenty-fifth, twenty-sixth, twenty-seventh, twenty-eighth, twenty-ninth and thirtieth judicial districts is entitled to one investigatorial assistant to be appointed by the district attorney and to serve at his pleasure. The Administrative Office of the Courts shall allocate additional investigatorial assistants to prosecutorial districts on the basis of need and within available appropriations. It shall be the duty of the investigatorial assistant to investigate cases preparatory to trial and to perform such other duties as may be assigned by the district attorney. The investigatorial assistant is entitled to reimbursement for his subsistence and travel expenses to the same extent as State employees generally."

- Sec. 4. In allocating administrative assistants, investigatorial assistants, victim and witness assistants, and other supporting positions to prosecutorial districts, the Administrative Office of the Courts shall give due consideration to recommendations of the Conference of District Attorneys.
- Sec. 5. There is appropriated from the General Fund to the Administrative Office of the Courts, \$6,156,211 for the 1989-90 fiscal year and \$6,013,535 for the 1990-91 fiscal year for the assistant district attorneys positions created by Section 1 of this act and for 28 additional victim and witness assistants, 23 investigatorial assistants, and 70 other support positions.
 - Sec. 6. This act shall become effective July 1, 1989.
