Description of Legislation

1. Summary of Legislation

Amends GS 106-65.23 to add one independent public representative appointed by the governor and one UNC School of Public Health epidemiology faculty member appointed by the dean to serve on the Structural Pest Control Committee. This legislation will increase the membership of the Structural Pest Control committee from five to seven.

2. Effective Date

The act is effective upon ratification, but the appointment from the School of Public Health will be added July 1, 1989 and the public representative will be appointed July 1, 1991.

The total budget for the Structural Pest Control Committee is \$2,200 for 1988-89. The committee meets about five times a year. The current membership of the Committee is five with two members being state employees. State employee members have no per diem costs. Since one of the new members proposed by this legislation is a state employee located in Chapel Hill, travel costs will be minimal. The costs for the public representative member proposed by this legislation will be depend on the location of his or her residence. The \$1,100 cost for 1990-91 is the highest possible cost assuming the public member must travel from the far reaches of the State. The cost also assumes five meetings of the Committee. The costs do not begin until 1990-91 because that is when the public representative's term starts.
