### A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

# 2 AN ACT TO IMPROVE THE QUALITY OF CARE PROVIDED TO DOMICILIARY3 CARE RESIDENTS.

Whereas, North Carolina has the second highest domiciliary bed to older adult population ratio in the nation, has the fourth highest domiciliary reimbursement rate in the nation, and has never conducted an independent fiscal audit with which to establish an actual reimbursement rate; and

8 Whereas, it is estimated that 66% of domiciliary residents have physical 9 disabilities, over 50% have mental disabilities, and less than 7% of the residents' 10 population have no physical or mental disabilities; and

11 Whereas, North Carolina domiciliary care regulations require no medical 12 assessment capacity beyond occasional and incidental medical care; and

13 Whereas, there are currently no specific formal training requirements for 14 personal care staff in North Carolina's domiciliary care rules and standards; and

15 Whereas, most domiciliary residents have multiple prescription and medical 16 needs and they do not manage their own medications or self-medicate; and

Whereas, there are no requirements for formal training in drug managementpractice for domiciliary staff; and

19 Whereas, domiciliary homes are exempt from registration under the North 20 Carolina Controlled Substances Act; Now, therefore,

21 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

22 Section 1. The Department of Human Resources shall ensure that a formal 23 resident assessment procedure, including an ongoing level of care review, is established 24 for all North Carolina residents.

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1 Sec. 2. The Department of Human Resources shall ensure that a 2 professionally trained medication technician is available in domiciliary care facilities for 3 every 30 residents.

4 Sec. 3. Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, domiciliary homes are 5 subject to the North Carolina Controlled Substances Act. The Commission for Mental 6 Health, Developmental Disabilities, and Substance Abuse Services shall adopt the rules 7 necessary to effect this section.

8 Sec. 4. The Department of Human Resources shall develop a plan to 9 establish a consistent State-certified training program for all personal care staff in North 10 Carolina's domiciliary care homes. The Department shall report this plan, together with 11 necessary proposed legislation, to the 1993 General Assembly by April 1, 1994.

12 Sec. 5. The Department of Human Resources shall ensure that all appropriate 13 State and county officials work together to ensure and enforce the protection of the 14 health, safety, and welfare of North Carolina's older adults who are dependent on the 15 present domiciliary care system. The Department shall work in cooperation with county 16 departments of social services, the North Carolina Association of County 17 Commissioners, and any other State or county officials it considers appropriate to effect 18 this section.

19 Sec. 6. There is appropriated to the Department of Human Resources the sum 20 of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) for the 1993-94 fiscal year and the sum of fifty 21 thousand dollars (\$50,000) for the 1994-95 fiscal year to implement this act.

22 Sec. 7. This act becomes effective July 1, 1993.
