1 A JOINT RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATIVE RESEARCH 2 COMMISSION TO STUDY THE ISSUE OF RECOVERY CARE CENTERS AND 3 THEIR ROLE IN DEVELOPING A SYSTEM OF AFFORDABLE, QUALITY 4 HEALTH CARE. 5 Whereas, health care costs are rising faster than the economy; and Whereas, the rising costs of hospital maintenance and hospital care are 6 7 fueling these increases; and Whereas, there have been significant advances in medicine over the last two 8 9 decades as a result of ambulatory surgery; and Whereas, other states have begun programs in which their ambulatory 10 surgical centers have been operating as "recovery care centers", keeping surgical 11 patients for up to 72 hours after their operations; and 12 Whereas, if true health reform is to be achieved, North Carolina must look to 13 14 bold new programs that, while they might pose some small risk, have the potential for producing great benefits; 15 16 Now, therefore, be it resolved by the House of Representatives, the Senate concurring: Section 1. The Legislative Research Commission may study the issue of 17 recovery care centers and their role in developing a system of affordable, quality health 18 care. This study may consider allowing certain ambulatory surgical facilities operating 19 as recovery care centers to admit patients needing extended recovery care for a period 20 21 not to exceed 72 hours and may consider how such a change would affect our State's 22 ever-rising health care costs as well as our State's ongoing need for quality health care.
