Secti	on 1. The General Assembly finds that:

Sec. 2. The State Board of Community Colleges shall, in consultation with the local boards of trustees of all affected community colleges and in consultation with the Economic Development Council created in G.S. 143B-434, study its Small Business Centers. As part of this study, the State Board shall review the distribution of funds in the program, review program statistics to assess its effectiveness in assisting small businesses, and determine options for fund distribution to provide for more effective delivery of program services. The State Board shall report to the General Assembly and the Joint Education Oversight Commission by July 1, 1994, on its findings.

Sec. 3. This act is effective upon ratification.
