| 7 | The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts: |
| 8 | Section 1. The heading of Article 31 of Chapter 14 of the General Statutes |
| 9 | reads as rewritten: |
| 10 | "Misconduct in Public Office and Employment." |
| 11 | Sec. 2. Chapter 14 of the General Statutes is amended by adding the |
| 12 | following new section to read: |
| 13 | " <u>§ 14-253. Prohibit gifts and favors to State purchasing agents.</u> |
| 14 | (a) Offense. It is unlawful for an officer or employee of a State department, |
| 15 | institution, or agency who has authority to purchase or procure property or services for |
| 16 | the State to solicit, receive, or agree to receive a gift or anything of a value over twenty- |
| 17 | five dollars (\$25.00) from a person or organization who intends to sell property or |
| 18 | services to that State department, institution, or agency. It is unlawful for a person or |
| 19 | organization who intends to sell property or services to a State department, institution, |
| 20 | or agency to offer or give a gift or anything of a value over twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) |
| 21 | to an officer or employee of that State department, institution, or agency who has |
| 22 | authority to purchase or procure property or services for the State. |

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- 1 (b) Exceptions. This section does not apply to the gift and receipt of
- 2 honorariums, advertising items and souvenirs of nominal value, and gifts and favors
 3 between relatives.
- 4 (c) <u>Punishment. A violation of this section is a Class J felony.</u>"
- 5 Sec. 3. This act becomes effective December 1, 1993, and applies to offenses 6 committed on or after that date.
