BILL SUMMARY: To require all workers in all nonregistered day care homes that receive reimbursement from the state complete training in pediatric CPR.

ASSUMPTIONS AND METHODOLOGY: Requiring nonregistered day care home providers to complete a CPR course, as well as a first-aid course, are requirements under rules adopted by the Social Services Commission. This bill assumes that since the day care home provider is already required to assume the costs for CPR and first-aid training, that they should also support the costs of pediatric CPR. If these assumptions are in keeping with the text of SB 397, then the bill presents no direct fiscal impact upon the state.

The average cost of a CPR class in North Carolina is \$23. Depending upon the instructor, the cost of the class may be free or much higher than \$23. In many counties, Red Cross organizations provide CPR training at no cost or a minimum fee.
