2	AN ACT TO ESTABLISH THE FAMILIES OF PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES
3	SUPPORT ACT.
4	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:
5	Section 1. Section 1, Article 3 of Chapter 143B of the General Statutes, is
6	amended by adding a new Part to read:
7	"PART 5C. FAMILIES OF PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES SUPPORT ACT.
8	" <u>§ 143B-152.20. Purpose.</u>
9	The purpose of this Part is to establish a Family Support Program for families of
10	persons with disabilities to assist families and adults with disabilities in identifying and
11	meeting their needs and to provide family- and people-centered alternatives to out-of-
12	home placement and institutionalization of adults and children with disabilities.
13	" <u>§ 143B-152.21. Legislative findings.</u>
14	The General Assembly makes the following findings of fact regarding families of
15	persons with disabilities and the service delivery system:
16	(1) It is in the best interest of the State to preserve, strengthen, and maintain
17	the family.
18	(2) Children and adults with disabilities need and deserve enduring family
19	relationships with caring people in a nurturing home environment.

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1	<u>(3)</u>	Children and adults with disabilities have unique positive contributions
2	<u>(5)</u>	to make to their families and to their communities.
3	<u>(4)</u>	Many families experience exceptionally high financial outlays and
4	<u> </u>	significant physical and emotional challenges in meeting the special
5		needs of members with disabilities throughout life.
6	<u>(5)</u>	A growing number of families are searching for ways to keep family
7	<u>(</u> <u>)</u>	members with disabilities in the family home or to assist adult members
8		with disabilities in living in their own homes within local communities.
9	<u>(6)</u>	Existing programs too often place children and adults with disabilities in
10	<u>, - /</u>	out-of-home settings, which can have a negative impact on their
11		families.
12	<u>(7)</u>	When family and friends provide the primary care for a family member
13	<del>\``</del>	with a disability, supplemented by community services and supports,
14		long-term care may be less costly than if the individual is placed outside
15		the family home.
16	<u>(8)</u>	Existing State programs have not always been adequate to provide
17	<u></u>	support services that help families keep members with disabilities at
18		home or in their own homes in local communities, as is illustrated by
19		the long waiting lists for services and programs, including out-of-home
20		placements, that currently exist in many areas of the State.
21	<u>(9)</u>	A comprehensive, coordinated system of family support services avoids
22		duplication of services, uses existing resources more efficiently, and
23		prevents gaps in services to families and adults with disabilities in all
24		areas of the State.

18	<u>(8)</u>	'Family support' means any one or combination of types of financial
19		assistance, including cash subsidy, voucher, or other form of

21	<u>(9)</u>	'Family Support Task Force' means the group of families, professionals,
22		and governmental representatives convened by the North Carolina
23		Council on Developmental Disabilities for the purpose of making
24		recommendations regarding the need for family support for persons with
25		disabilities in the State of North Carolina.
26	<u>(10)</u>	'Financial assistance' means any one or combination of cash subsidy, or
27		voucher, or other form of reimbursement used to meet the unique needs
28		of each eligible family or adult with a disability, which assistance is
29		used to supplement, not supplant, other assistance for which the family
30		<u>is eligible.</u>
31	<u>(11)</u>	'Legal guardian' means a person who has been designated a guardian
32		under Chapter 35A of the General Statutes.
33	<u>(12)</u>	'Local Family Support Council' means a private, nongovernmental
34		entity that has been selected to carry out a local program of family
35		support services pursuant to this Part.
36	<u>(13)</u>	'People-centered' means an approach to intervention in which the course
37		and manner of service delivery and resource provision are flexible,
38		functional, and chosen or expressed by the individual; in which a wide
39		range of formal and informal resources are used to strengthen the
40		individual's capacity to meet his own needs; in which professionals act,
41		at the election of the individual and the individual's family, as agents or
42		partners and intervene in a manner that promotes increased

7	support services. Family support services families may secure, by cash or by other
8	means, such as vouchers, under the Families With Disabilities Support Program shall
9	include: respite care; child care; sitter services; recreation; camp; family counseling;
10	family support groups; siblings groups; parent training; homemaker services; personal
11	assistance services; home health care; chores; adaptive equipment; home modification;
12	vehicle modifications; transportation; special diet; utilities; health insurance; home
12	repairs; rent assistance; information and referral; advocacy; person-and family-centered
14	planning; transition planning; supported employment; crisis intervention; assistive
15	technology; case management/service coordination; behavior management; medical;
16	dental; speech therapy; skills training; occupational therapy; evaluation/assessment;
17	physical therapy; nursing; and individual counseling.
18	The use of financial assistance and services will be determined by the family or adult
19	with a disability, and be provided in a manner consistent with the needs and choices of
20	the family or adult with a disability.
21	The family support services listed in this section are those for which a family may
22	receive a cash subsidy, receive vouchers, or otherwise be reimbursed.
23	Nothing in this Part shall mandate the creation or provision of services by any
24	governmental agency or private entity.
25	" <u>§ 143B-152.25. Eligibility for Program.</u>
26	A family is eligible for participation in the Family Support Program if the family:
27	(1) Resides in this State;
28	(2) Includes a child or adult with a disability; and
29	(3) Earns an annual adjusted gross income of less than sixty thousand
30	dollars (\$60,000), plus an annual cost-of-living adjustment, except in
31	cases in which severe hardship is demonstrated, in which cases the
32	family may earn more than sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000) plus cost-
33	of-living adjustment and be eligible.
34	" <u>§ 143B-152.26. Program; organization; administration.</u>
35	(a) <u>The Division shall be responsible for the Families of Persons With Disabilities</u>
36	Support Program created by this Part.
37	(b) Grants for local implementation of the Family Support Program shall be made
38	to Local Family Support Councils. Available funds may be utilized for direct costs,
39 40	including cash subsidies, vouchers, or other forms of reimbursement for services,
40	Division costs related to the implementation of this Part, including family support
41 42	personnel, travel, supplies, training, evaluation, and costs related to State and Local Family Support Councils, including staff, travel expenses, and Council member
42 43	honoraria. The Division shall not utilize appropriated funds for general administrative
43	nonoraria. The Division shan not utilize appropriated runds for general administrative

1	costs. Administrative charges assessed by the area authorities shall not exceed four and
2	eight-tenths percent (4.8%) of the amount of the grants to the Local Family Support
3	Councils.
4	(c) <u>The Division and the State Family Support Council shall jointly prepare, adopt,</u>
5	annually review, and revise a State Family Support Plan that shall:
6	(1) Assess needs, establish goals, and set priorities for the provision of
7	family support services under this Part;
8	(2) Provide for coordinated delivery of family support services and ensure
9	procedures for comprehensive services, resources, and programs under
10	this Part; and
11	(3) Review and comment on plans and services provided by State agencies
12	that affect the State Plan developed under this Part.
13	(d) The Division, in cooperation with State and Local Family Support Councils
14	and other governmental entities, shall implement the State Plan by:
15	(1) Providing technical assistance to entities that are developing programs
16	for family support services, Local Family Support Councils, and other
17	agencies and organizations involved in providing services to persons
18	with disabilities; and
19	(2) <u>Preparing annually a budget to be submitted to the General Assembly by</u>
20	the Governor.
21	(e) The Division, in cooperation with the State and Local Family Support
22	Councils, shall assist in coordinating efforts by the Councils, other governmental entities,
23	nongovernmental entities, and consumer and provider organizations to provide family
24	support services.
25	(f) The Division, in cooperation with the State Family Support Council, shall
26	adopt rules necessary and appropriate to administer and implement the provisions of this
27	Part.
28	(g) The Division and area authorities, in cooperation with the State and Local
29	Family Support Councils and other appropriate entities, shall conduct a program of
30	outreach and public information regarding the purpose of the Families of Persons With
31	Disabilities Support Program and its availability in participating communities. The
32	outreach shall include informing potentially eligible individuals and families who are
33	currently receiving services from area authorities or contract agencies, as well as
34	notifying other public land private agencies serving eligible families. In conducting the
35	public information activities, the Division and area authorities shall involve the media
36	and the Interagency Coordinating Council, established pursuant to G.S. 143B-179.5, the
37	local Interagency Coordinating Councils, and related consumer and provider
38	organizations.
39	(h) Within two years of the enactment of this Part, the Division, in cooperation
40	with the State Family Support Council, the area authorities, and other appropriate entities,
41	shall prepare an evaluation of the Families of Persons With Disabilities Support Program,
42	including information based upon a survey of participating families and adults with
43	disabilities, demographic information, impact of the Program on out-of-home placements
