6	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:
7	Section 1. Part 4A of Article 3 of Chapter 143B of the General Statutes reads

this Part. In developing the Program the Secretary shall consider the advice and
 recommendations of the Advisory Committee on Family-Centered Services.

3 (b) The purpose of the <u>Intensive</u> Family Preservation Services Program is, where 4 feasible and in the best interests of the child and the family, to keep the family unit intact 5 by providing intensive family-centered services that help create, within the family, 6 positive, long-term changes in the home environment.

7 (c) <u>Intensive</u> Family preservation services shall be financed in part through grants 8 to local agencies for the development and implementation of locally-based <u>intensive</u> 9 family preservation services. Grants to local agencies shall be made in accordance with 10 the provisions of G.S. 143B-150.6.

(d) The Secretary of the Department of Human Resources shall ensure the
cooperation of the Division of Social Services, the Division of Youth Services, the
Division of Mental Health, Developmental Disabilities, and Substance Abuse Services,
and the Division of Medical Assistance, in carrying out the provisions of this Part.

15 "§ 143B-150.6. Program services; eligibility; grants for local projects; fund transfers.

17 (a) Services: Services to be provided under the <u>Intensive</u> Family Preservation 18 Services Program shall include but are not limited to: family assessment, intensive family 19 and individual counseling, client advocacy, case management, development and 20 enhancement of parenting skills, and referral for other services as appropriate.

(b) Eligibility: Families eligible for services under the <u>Intensive</u> Family
 Preservation Services Program are those with children ages 0-17 years who are at risk of
 imminent separation through placement in public welfare, mental health, or juvenile
 justice systems.

(c) Service Delivery: Services delivered to eligible families under the <u>Intensive</u>
 Family Preservation Services Program shall be provided in accordance with the following
 requirements:

- 28 (1) Each eligible family shall receive intensive family preservation services,
 29 beginning with identification of an imminent risk of out-of-home
 30 placement, for an average of four weeks but not more than six weeks;
- 31 (2) At least one-half of a caseworker's time spent providing family
 32 preservation services to each eligible family shall be provided in the
 33 family's home and community;
- 34 (3) Family preservation caseworkers shall be available to each eligible
 35 family by telephone and on call for visits 24 hours a day, seven days a
 36 week.

(4) Each family preservation caseworker shall provide services to a maximum of four families at any given time.

(d) Grants for local projects: The Secretary of the Department of Human
Resources shall award grants to local agencies for the development and implementation
of locally-based <u>intensive</u> family preservation services projects. In awarding the grants,
the Secretary shall consider the recommendations of the Advisory Committee on FamilyCentered Services. The number of grants awarded and the level of funding of each grant

for each fiscal year shall be contingent upon and determined by <u>the amount of funds</u> appropriated for that purpose by the General Assembly available to the Department for that <u>purpose</u> and shall be in accordance with the phase-in period of the <u>Intensive</u> Family Preservation Services Program. During the phase-in period, and to the extent funds are appropriated, available, grants shall be awarded by the Secretary on a competitive basis to local agencies who submit proposals for <u>such-this</u> funding, which proposals meet grant award criteria established by the Advisory Committee on Family-Centered Services.

8 (e) Inter-agency fund transfers: The Department may allow the Division of Social 9 Services, the Division of Youth Services, and the Division of Mental Health, 10 Developmental Disabilities, and Substance Abuse Services, to use funds available to each 11 Division to support <u>intensive</u> family preservation services provided by the Division under 12 the Program; provided that such use does not violate federal regulations pertaining to, or 13 otherwise jeopardize the availability of federal funds.

14 "§ 143B-150.7. Advisory Committee on Family-Centered Services; establishment, 15 membership, compensation.

16 (a) There is established the Advisory Committee on Family-Centered Services17 within the Department of Human Resources.

18 The Committee shall have 24-36 members appointed for staggered four-year (b) terms and until their successors are appointed and qualify. The Governor shall have the 19 20 power to remove any member of the Committee from office in accordance with the 21 provisions of G.S. 143B-13. Members may succeed themselves for one term and may be appointed again after being off the Committee for one term. Six of the members shall be 22 23 legislators appointed by the General Assembly, three of whom shall be recommended by 24 the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and three of whom shall be recommended by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate. Two of the members shall be appointed by 25 the General Assembly from the public at large, one of whom shall be recommended by 26 the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and one of whom shall be recommended by 27 the President Pro Tempore of the Senate. The remainder of the members shall be 28 29 appointed by the Governor as follows:

- 30 (1) Four-Five members representing the Department of Human Resources,
 31 one of whom shall be the Assistant Secretary for Children and Family,
 32 one of whom shall be the Director of the Division of Family
 33 Development, one of whom shall represent the Division of Social
 34 Services, one of whom shall represent the Division of Youth Services,
 35 and one of whom shall represent the Division of Mental Health,
 36 Developmental Disabilities, and Substance Abuse Services;
- 37 (2) Three members, one from each of the following: the Administrative
 38 Office of the Courts, the Department of Public Instruction, and the
 39 Division of Maternal and Child Health of the Department of
 40 Environment, Health, and Natural Resources;
- 41 (3) One member who represents the Juvenile Justice Planning Committee of 42 the Governor's Crime Commission, and one member appointed at large;

28		Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations, and to the
29		Commission on the Family. The report shall address the progress in
30		implementation of the Intensive Family Preservation Services Program.
