1 A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
2 AN ACT TO AMEND CERTAIN PROVISIONS OF LAW THAT REGULATE
3 ATTORNEYS-AT-LAW.
4 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:
5 Section 1. G.S. 84-1 reads as rewritten:
6 "**§ 84-1. Oaths taken in open court.**
7 Attorneys before they shall be admitted to practice law shall, in open court before a
8 justice or judge of the General Court of Justice, personally appear and take the oath
9 prescribed for ~~attorneys,~~attorneys by G.S. 11-11, and also the oaths of allegiance to the
10 State, and to support the Constitution of the United States, prescribed for all public
11 officers,~~officers~~ by Article VI, Sec. 7 of the North Carolina Constitution and G.S. 11-7,
12 and the same shall be entered on the records of the court; and, upon such qualification
13 had, and oath taken may act as attorneys during their good behavior."
14 Sec. 2. G.S. 84-2 reads as rewritten:
15 "**§ 84-2. Persons disqualified.**

1 No justice, judge, full-time district attorney, full-time assistant district attorney, public
2 defender, assistant public defender, clerk, deputy or assistant clerk of the General Court
3 of Justice, ~~nor~~ register of deeds, deputy or assistant register of deeds, ~~nor sheriff,~~ sheriff or
4 deputy sheriff shall engage in the private practice of law. Persons violating this provision
5 shall be guilty of a Class 3 misdemeanor and only fined not less than two hundred dollars
6 (\$200.00)."

7 Sec. 3. G.S. 84-2.1 reads as rewritten:

8 **"§ 84-2.1. 'Practice law' defined.**

9 The phrase 'practice law' as used in this Chapter is defined to be performing any legal
10 service for any other person, firm or corporation, with or without compensation,
11 specifically including the preparation or aiding in the preparation of deeds, mortgages,
12 wills, trust instruments, inventories, accounts or reports of guardians, trustees,
13 administrators or executors, or preparing or aiding in the preparation of any petitions or
14 orders in any probate or court proceeding; abstracting or passing upon titles, the
15 preparation and filing of petitions for use in any court, including administrative tribunals
16 and other judicial or quasi-judicial bodies, or assisting by advice, counsel, or otherwise in
17 any ~~such~~ legal work; and to advise or give opinion upon the legal rights of any person,
18 firm or corporation: Provided, that the above reference to particular acts which are
19 specifically included within the definition of the phrase 'practice law' shall not be
20 construed to limit the foregoing general definition of ~~such~~ the term, but shall be construed
21 to include the foregoing particular acts, as well as all other acts within ~~said~~ the general
22 definition."

23 Sec. 4. G.S. 84-4 reads as rewritten:

24 **"§ 84-4. Persons other than members of State Bar prohibited from practicing law.**

25 ~~It~~ Except as otherwise permitted by law, it shall be unlawful for any person or
26 association of persons, except active members of the Bar of the State of North Carolina
27 admitted and licensed to practice as attorneys-at-law, to appear as attorney or counselor at
28 law in any action or proceeding ~~in any court in this State or before any judicial body or~~
29 body, including the North Carolina Industrial Commission, or the Utilities Commission;
30 to maintain, conduct, or defend the same, except in his own behalf as a party thereto; or,
31 by word, sign, letter, or advertisement, to hold out himself, or themselves, as competent
32 or qualified to give legal advice or counsel, or to prepare legal documents, or as being
33 engaged in advising or counseling in law or acting as attorney or counselor-at-law, or in
34 furnishing the services of a lawyer or lawyers; and it shall be unlawful for any person or
35 association of persons except active members of the Bar, for or without a fee or
36 consideration, to give legal advice or counsel, perform for or furnish to another legal
37 services, or to prepare directly or through another for another person, firm or corporation,
38 any will or testamentary disposition, or instrument of trust, or to organize corporations or
39 prepare for another person, firm or corporation, any other legal document. Provided, that
40 nothing herein shall prohibit any person from drawing a will for another in an emergency
41 wherein the imminence of death leaves insufficient time to have the same drawn and its
42 execution supervised by a licensed attorney-at-law. The provisions of this section shall
43 be in addition to and not in lieu of any other provisions of ~~Chapter 84.~~ this Chapter.

1 Provided, however, this section shall not apply to corporations authorized to practice law
2 under the provisions of Chapter 55B of the General Statutes of North Carolina."

3 Sec. 5. G.S. 84-4.1 reads as rewritten:

4 **"§ 84-4.1. Limited practice of out-of-state attorneys.**

5 Any attorney domiciled in another state, and regularly admitted to practice in the
6 courts of record of that state and in good standing therein, having been retained as
7 attorney for a party to any civil or criminal legal proceeding pending in the General Court
8 of Justice of North Carolina, ~~or the North Carolina Utilities Commission-Commission, or~~
9 ~~the North Carolina Industrial Commission-Commission, or the Office of Administrative~~
10 ~~Hearings of North Carolina-Carolina, or any administrative agency,~~ may, on motion, be
11 admitted to practice in the General Court of Justice ~~or the North Carolina Utilities Commission~~
12 ~~or the North Carolina Industrial Commission or the Office of Administrative Hearings of North~~
13 ~~Carolina~~ that forum for the sole purpose of appearing for a client in the litigation. The
14 motion required under this section shall contain or be accompanied by:

- 15 (1) The attorney's full name, post-office ~~address-address,~~ bar membership
16 number, and status as a practicing attorney in another state.
- 17 (2) A statement, signed by the client, setting forth the client's address and
18 declaring that the client has retained the attorney to represent the client
19 in the proceeding.
- 20 (3) A statement that unless permitted to withdraw sooner by order of the
21 court, the attorney will continue to represent the client in the proceeding
22 until the final determination thereof, and that with reference to all
23 matters incident to the proceeding, the attorney agrees to be subject to
24 the orders and amenable to the disciplinary action and the civil
25 jurisdiction of the General Court of Justice and the North Carolina State
26 Bar in all respects as if the attorney were a regularly admitted and
27 licensed member of the Bar of North Carolina in good standing.
- 28 (4) A statement that the state in which the attorney is regularly admitted to
29 practice grants like privileges to members of the Bar of North Carolina
30 in good standing.
- 31 (5) A statement to the effect that the attorney has associated and is
32 personally appearing in the proceeding, with an attorney who is a
33 resident of this State and is duly and legally admitted to practice in the
34 General Court of Justice of North Carolina, upon whom service may be
35 had in all matters connected with ~~such-the~~ the legal proceedings, or any
36 disciplinary matter, with the same effect as if personally made on the
37 foreign attorney within this State.

38 Compliance with the foregoing requirements does not deprive the court of the
39 discretionary power to allow or reject the application."

40 Sec. 6. G.S. 84-4.2 reads as rewritten:

41 **"§ 84-4.2. Summary revocation of permission granted out-of-state attorneys to**
42 **practice.**

1 Permission granted under ~~the preceding section~~ G.S. 84-4.1 may be summarily revoked
2 by the General Court of Justice or any agency, including the North Carolina Utilities
3 Commission, on its own motion and in its discretion."

4 Sec. 7. G.S. 84-14 is recodified as G.S. 7A-97 in Article 11 of Chapter 7A of
5 the General Statutes.

6 Sec. 8. G.S. 84-16 reads as rewritten:

7 **"§ 84-16. Membership and privileges.**

8 The membership of the North Carolina State Bar shall consist of two classes, active
9 and inactive.

10 The active members shall be all persons who shall have heretofore obtained, or who
11 shall hereafter obtain, a license or certificate, which shall at the time be valid and
12 effectual, entitling them to practice law in the State of North Carolina, who shall have
13 paid the membership dues hereinafter specified, unless classified as an inactive member
14 by the Council as hereinafter provided. No person other than a member of the North
15 Carolina State Bar shall practice in any court of the State except foreign attorneys as
16 provided by statute.

17 Inactive members shall be all persons found by the Council to be not engaged in the
18 practice of law and not holding themselves out as practicing attorneys and not occupying
19 any public or private positions in which they may be called upon to give legal advice or
20 counsel or to examine the law or to pass ~~upon~~ upon, adjudicate, or offer an opinion
21 concerning the legal effect of any act, document, or law.

22 All active members shall be required to pay annual membership fees, and shall have
23 the right to ~~vote~~ vote in elections held by the district bar in the judicial district in which
24 the member resides. A member shall be entitled to vote at all annual or special meetings of the
25 North Carolina State Bar, and at all meetings of and elections held by the bar of each of the
26 judicial districts in which he resides: Provided, that if ~~he~~ a member desires to vote with the
27 bar of some district in which ~~he~~ the member practices, other than that in which ~~he~~ the
28 member resides, ~~he~~ the member may do so ~~upon~~ by filing with the resident judge of the
29 district in which he resides (and, after the North Carolina State Bar shall have been organized as
30 hereinafter set forth, with the secretary-treasurer of the North Carolina State Bar), his the
31 Secretary of the North Carolina State Bar a statement in writing that he the member
32 desires to vote in such the other district: Provided, however, that in no case shall ~~he~~ the
33 member be entitled to vote in more than one district."

34 Sec. 9. G.S. 84-17 reads as rewritten:

35 **"§ 84-17. Government.**

36 The government of the North Carolina State Bar is vested in a council of the North
37 Carolina State Bar ~~hereinafter~~ referred to in this Chapter as the 'council', 'Council', which
38 shall be composed of ~~50~~ 55 councilors exclusive of officers, except as hereinafter
39 provided, to be appointed or elected as hereinafter set forth, the officers of the North
40 Carolina State Bar, who shall be councilors during their respective terms of office, and
41 each retiring president of the North Carolina State Bar who shall be a councilor for one
42 year from the date of expiration of his term as ~~president, whose term of office expires at the~~
43 ~~1973 annual meeting or after.~~ president. Notwithstanding any other provisions of the law,

1 the North Carolina State Bar ~~shall have the power and authority to~~ may acquire, hold, rent,
2 encumber, alienate, and otherwise deal with real or personal property in the same manner
3 as any private person or corporation, subject only to the approval of the Governor and the
4 Council of State as to the acquisition, rental, encumbering, leasing and sale of real
5 property. ~~The North Carolina State Bar Council is authorized and empowered in its discretion~~
6 ~~to utilize the services of the Purchase and Contract Division of the Department of~~
7 ~~Administration for the procurement of personal property, in accordance with the provisions of~~
8 ~~Article 3 of Chapter 143 of the General Statutes. Notwithstanding any provisions of this Article~~
9 ~~as to the voting powers of members, the council~~ The Council shall be competent to exercise
10 the entire powers of the North Carolina State Bar in respect of the interpretation and
11 administration of this Article, the acquisition, lease, sale, or mortgage of property, real or
12 personal, the seeking of amendments hereto, and all other ~~matters, except as otherwise~~
13 ~~directed or overruled, as in G.S. 84-33 provided.~~ matters. There shall be one councilor from
14 each judicial district and additional councilors as are necessary to make the total number
15 of councilors ~~50.~~ 55. The additional councilors shall be allocated and reallocated by the
16 North Carolina State Bar every six years ~~on the basis of the number of the~~ based on the
17 number of active members of each judicial district bar according to the records of the
18 North Carolina State Bar and in accordance with a formula to be adopted by the North
19 Carolina State Bar, to insure an allocation based on lawyer population of each judicial
20 district bar as it relates to the total number of active members of the State Bar.

21 A councilor whose seat has been eliminated due to a reallocation shall continue to
22 serve on the ~~council~~ Council until expiration of the remainder of the current term. A
23 councilor whose judicial district is altered by the General Assembly during the
24 councilor's term shall continue to serve on the Council until the expiration of the term and
25 shall represent the district wherein the councilor resides or with which the councilor has
26 elected to be affiliated. If before the alteration of the judicial district of the councilor the
27 judicial district included both the place of residence and the place of practice of the
28 councilor, and if after the alteration of the judicial district the councilor's place of
29 residence and place of practice are located in different districts, the councilor must, not
30 later than 10 days from the effective date of the alteration of the district, notify the
31 Secretary of the North Carolina State Bar of an election to affiliate with and represent
32 either the councilor's district of residence or district of practice.

33 In addition to the ~~50~~ 55 councilors, there shall be three public members not licensed to
34 practice law in this or any other state who shall be appointed by the Governor. The
35 public members may vote and participate in all matters before the Council to the same
36 extent as councilors elected or appointed from the various judicial districts."

37 Sec. 10. G.S. 84-18 reads as rewritten:

38 **"§ 84-18. Terms, election and appointment of councilors.**

39 (a) Except as set out in this section, the terms of councilors are fixed at three years
40 commencing on the first day of January in the year following their election. A year shall
41 be the calendar year. No councilor may serve more than three successive three-year
42 terms but a councilor may serve an unlimited number of three successive three-year terms
43 provided a three-year period of nonservice intervenes in each instance. Any councilor

1 serving a partial term of 18 months or more is considered to have served a full term and
2 shall be eligible to be elected to only two successive three-year terms in addition to the
3 partial term. Any councilor serving a partial term of less than 18 months is eligible to be
4 elected to three successive three-year terms in addition to the partial term. This
5 paragraph shall not apply to officers of the State Bar.

6 ~~All councilors serving at the effective date of these changes shall remain in office and~~
7 ~~continue to represent their district for the remainder of their term. Those who have~~
8 ~~already served for 18 months or more shall be eligible for election to two additional~~
9 ~~three year terms and be ineligible for election thereafter until a period of three years has~~
10 ~~expired. Those who have served less than 18 months shall be eligible for election to three~~
11 ~~consecutive three-year terms and be ineligible for election thereafter until an intervening~~
12 ~~three-year period has expired.~~

13 The secretary of a judicial district bar shall notify the secretary-treasurer of the State
14 Bar in writing of any additions to or deletions from the delegation of councilors
15 representing the district within 90 days of the effective date of the change. No new
16 councilor shall assume a seat until official notice of the election has been given to the
17 secretary-treasurer of the State Bar.

18 ~~When a judicial district loses a councilor or is entitled to an additional councilor by~~
19 ~~virtue of reallocation of councilors as provided in G.S. 84-17 above, then the affected~~
20 ~~judicial districts shall certify to the State Bar Council the identity of that judicial district's~~
21 ~~authorized councilor or councilors. This certification shall be made within 90 days of the~~
22 ~~date the reallocation is made and reported to the judicial districts affected. Until this~~
23 ~~certification is received, the district shall have no representation on the State Bar Council.~~
24 ~~In the case of reallocation, the certification shall be made within 90 days.~~

25 Any active member of the North Carolina State Bar member, other than an inactive
26 member, is eligible to serve as a councilor from the judicial district in which he or she the
27 member is eligible to vote.

28 (b) ~~The State Bar Council~~ may promulgate rules to govern the election and
29 appointment of councilors. The election and appointment of councilors shall be as
30 follows:

31 Each judicial district bar shall elect one eligible North Carolina State Bar member for
32 each ~~State Bar Council~~ vacancy in the district. Any vacancy occurring after the election,
33 whether caused by resignation, ~~death-death,~~ reconfiguration of the district by the General
34 Assembly, or otherwise shall be filled by the judicial district bar in which the vacancy
35 occurs. The appointment shall be for the unexpired portion of the term and shall be
36 certified to the ~~State Bar Council~~ by the judicial district bar. Any appointed councilor
37 shall be subject to the terms set forth in subsection (a) of G.S. 84-18.

38 (c) Public members shall serve three-year terms. No public member shall serve
39 more than two complete consecutive terms. The Secretary of the North Carolina State
40 Bar shall promptly inform the Governor when any seat occupied by a public member
41 becomes vacant. The successor shall serve the remainder of the term. Any public
42 member serving a partial term of 18 months or more is considered to have served a full
43 term and is eligible to be elected to only one additional three-year term in addition to the

1 partial term. Any public member serving a partial term of less than 18 months is eligible
2 to be elected to two successive three-year terms in addition to the partial term."

3 Sec. 11. G.S. 84-18.1 reads as rewritten:

4 **"§ 84-18.1. Membership and fees of district bars.**

5 (a) The district bar shall be a subdivision of the North Carolina State Bar subject
6 to the general supervisory authority of the Council and may adopt rules, regulations and
7 bylaws that are not inconsistent with this Article. A copy of any rules, regulations and
8 bylaws that are adopted, along with any subsequent amendments, shall be transmitted to
9 the Secretary-Treasurer of the North Carolina State Bar.

10 (b) Any district bar may from time to time by a majority vote of ~~its membership~~ the
11 members present at a duly called meeting prescribe an annual membership fee to be paid
12 by its active members as a service charge to promote and maintain its administration,
13 activities and programs. ~~Such~~ The fee shall be in addition to, but shall not exceed, the
14 amount of the membership fee prescribed by G.S. 84-34 for active members of the North
15 Carolina State Bar. The district bar shall mail a written notice to every active member of
16 the district bar at least 30 days before any meeting at which an election is held to impose
17 or increase mandatory district bar dues. Every active member of a district bar which has
18 prescribed an annual membership fee shall keep its secretary-treasurer notified of his
19 correct mailing address and shall pay the prescribed fee at the time and place set forth in
20 the demand for payment mailed to him by its secretary-treasurer. The name of each
21 active member of a district bar who ~~shall be~~ is more than 12 full calendar months in
22 arrears in the payment of any ~~such~~ fee shall be furnished by the secretary-treasurer of the
23 district bar to the ~~council of the North Carolina State Bar~~ Council. In the exercise of its
24 powers as set forth in G.S. 84-23, the ~~council~~ Council shall thereupon take ~~such~~
25 disciplinary or other action with reference to the delinquent as it considers necessary and
26 proper."

27 Sec. 12. G.S. 84-19 reads as rewritten:

28 **"§ 84-19. Judicial districts definition.**

29 For purposes of this Article, the term 'judicial district' ~~means a judicial district as in~~
30 ~~existence on January 1, 1987,~~ refers to prosecutorial districts established by the General
31 Assembly and the term 'district bar' means the bar of a judicial district as defined by this
32 section."

33 Sec. 13. G.S. 84-20 reads as rewritten:

34 **"§ 84-20. Compensation of councilors.**

35 The members of the ~~council~~ Council and members of committees when actually
36 engaged in the performance of their duties, including committees sitting upon disbarment
37 proceedings, shall receive as compensation ~~not exceeding ten dollars (\$10.00) per day~~ for the
38 time spent in attending ~~meetings,~~ meetings an amount to be determined by the Council,
39 subject to approval of the North Carolina Supreme Court, and shall receive actual
40 expenses of travel and subsistence while engaged in ~~his~~ their duties provided that for
41 transportation by use of private automobile the expense of travel shall not exceed ~~ten cents~~
42 ~~(10¢) per mile.~~ the rate per mile allowed by G.S. 138-6. The ~~council~~ Council shall
43 determine ~~per diem,~~ per diem, ~~subsistence~~ per diem and mileage to be paid. ~~Such~~ The allowance as

1 ~~may be fixed by the council~~ Council shall be paid by the secretary-treasurer of the North
2 Carolina State Bar upon ~~certified statements presented~~ presentation of appropriate
3 documentation by each member."

4 Sec. 14. G.S. 84-21 reads as rewritten:

5 **"§ 84-21. Organization of ~~council~~; Council; publication of rules, regulations and**
6 **bylaws.**

7 Upon ~~receiving notification of the election of a councilor for each judicial district, or,~~
8 ~~if such notification shall not have been received from all said districts, within 120 days~~
9 ~~after this Article shall have gone into effect, the clerk of the Supreme Court of North~~
10 ~~Carolina shall call a meeting of the councilors of whose election he shall have been~~
11 ~~notified, to be held in the City of Raleigh not less than 20 days nor more than 30 days~~
12 ~~after the date of said call; and at the meeting so held the councilors attending the same~~
13 ~~shall proceed to organize the council by electing officers, taking appropriate steps toward~~
14 ~~the adoption of rules and regulations, electing councilors for judicial districts which have~~
15 ~~failed to elect them, and taking such other action as they may deem to be in furtherance~~
16 ~~of this Article. The regular term of all officers shall be one year, but those first elected~~
17 ~~shall serve until January 1, 1935. The council shall be the judge of the election and~~
18 ~~qualifications of its own members. When the council shall have been fully organized and~~
19 ~~shall have adopted such rules, regulations and bylaws, not inconsistent with this Article,~~
20 ~~as it shall deem necessary or expedient for the discharge of its duties, the secretary-~~
21 ~~treasurer shall file with the clerk of the Supreme Court of North Carolina a certificate, to~~
22 ~~be called the "certificate of organization," showing the officers and members of the~~
23 ~~council, with the judicial districts which the members respectively represent, and their~~
24 ~~post office addresses, and the rules, regulations and bylaws adopted by it; and thereupon~~
25 ~~the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of North Carolina, or any judge thereof, if the~~
26 ~~court be then in vacation, shall examine the said certificate and, if of opinion that the~~
27 ~~requirements of this Article have been complied with, shall cause the said certificate to be~~
28 ~~spread upon the minutes of the court; but if of opinion that the requirements of this~~
29 ~~Article have not been complied with, shall return the said certificate to the secretary-~~
30 ~~treasurer with a statement showing in what respects the provisions of this Article have not~~
31 ~~been complied with; and the said certificate shall not be again presented to the Chief~~
32 ~~Justice of the Supreme Court or any judge thereof, until any such defects in the~~
33 ~~organization of the council shall have been corrected, at which time a new certificate of~~
34 ~~organization shall be presented and the same course taken as hereinabove provided, and~~
35 ~~so on until a correct certificate showing the proper organization of the council shall have~~
36 ~~been presented, and the organization of the council accordingly completed. Upon (a)~~

37 ~~the entry of an order upon the minutes of the court that the requirements of this~~
38 ~~Article have been complied with, or (b) if for any reason the Chief Justice or judge~~
39 ~~should not act thereon within 30 days, then, after the lapse of 30 days from the~~
40 ~~presentation to the Chief Justice or judge, as the case may be, of any certificate of~~
41 ~~organization hereinbefore required to be presented by the secretary-treasurer, without~~
42 ~~either the entry of an order or the return of said certificate with a statement showing the~~
43 ~~respects in which this Article has not been complied with, the organization of the council~~

1 shall be deemed to be complete, and it shall be vested with the powers herein set forth;
2 and the certificate of organization shall thereupon forthwith be spread upon the minutes
3 of the court. A copy of the certificate of organization, as spread upon the minutes of the
4 court, shall be published in the next ensuing volume of the North Carolina Reports and in
5 the North Carolina Administrative Code.—The rules and regulations set forth in the
6 certificate of organization, and all other rules and regulations which may be adopted by
7 the ~~council~~ Council under this Article, Article may be amended by the ~~council~~ Council
8 from time to time in any manner not inconsistent with this Article. Copies of all such
9 rules and regulations ~~adopted subsequently to the filing of the certificate of organization,~~
10 and of all amendments ~~so made~~ adopted by the ~~council~~ Council shall be certified to the
11 Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of North Carolina, entered by ~~it~~ the North Carolina
12 Supreme Court upon its minutes, and published in the next ensuing number of the North
13 Carolina Reports and in the North Carolina Administrative Code: Provided, that the court
14 may decline to have so entered upon its minutes any ~~of such~~ rules, regulations and
15 amendments which in the opinion of the Chief Justice are inconsistent with this Article."

16 Sec. 15. G.S. 84-22 reads as rewritten:

17 "**§ 84-22. Officers and committees of the North Carolina State Bar.**

18 The officers of the North Carolina State Bar and the Council shall consist of a
19 president, president-elect, vice-president and an immediate past president, who shall be
20 deemed members of the Council in all respects. The president, president-elect and vice-
21 president need not be members of the ~~State Bar~~ Council at the time of their election.
22 There shall be a secretary-treasurer who shall also have the title of executive director, but
23 who shall not be a member of the ~~State Bar~~ Council. All officers shall be elected annually
24 by the ~~State Bar~~ Council at an election to take place at the annual meeting of the North
25 Carolina State Bar. The regular term of all officers is one year. The Council is the judge
26 of the election and qualifications of its members.

27 In addition to the committees and commissions as may be specifically established or
28 authorized by law, the North Carolina State Bar may have committees, standing or
29 special, as from time to time the Council ~~of the North Carolina State Bar~~ deems appropriate
30 for the proper discharge of the duties and functions of the North Carolina State Bar. The
31 Council ~~of the North Carolina State Bar~~ shall determine the number of members,
32 composition, method of appointment or election, functions, powers and duties, structure,
33 authority to act, and other matters relating to each committee. Any committee may, at the
34 discretion of the appointing or electing authority, be composed of Council members or

4 annually, at a time and in a law magazine or daily newspaper to be prescribed by the
5 ~~council~~ Council, publish an account of the financial ~~transaction~~ transactions of the ~~council~~
6 Council in a form to be prescribed by it. The secretary-treasurer shall compile and keep
7 currently correct from the names and ~~post office~~ mailing addresses forwarded to ~~him~~ the
8 secretary-treasurer and from any other available sources of information a list of members
9 of the North Carolina State Bar and furnish to the clerk of the superior court in each
10 county, not later than the first day of October in each year, a list showing the name and
11 address of each attorney for that county who has not complied with the provisions of this
12 Article. The name of each of the active members who ~~shall be~~ are in arrears in the
13 payment of membership fees ~~for one or more calendar years~~ shall be furnished to the
14 presiding judge at the next term of the superior court after the first day of October of each
15 year, by the clerk of the superior court of each county wherein ~~said~~ the member or
16 members reside, and the court shall thereupon take ~~such~~ action as that is necessary and
17 proper. The names and addresses of ~~such~~ attorneys so certified shall be kept available to
18 the public. The Secretary of Revenue is hereby directed to supply the secretary-treasurer,
19 from ~~his record~~ records of license tax payments, with any information for which the
20 secretary-treasurer may call in order to enable ~~him~~ the secretary-treasurer to comply with
21 this requirement.

22 The ~~said~~ list submitted to several clerks of the superior court shall also be submitted to
23 the ~~council of the North Carolina State Bar~~ Council at its October meeting of each year and
24 it shall take ~~such~~ the action thereon ~~as that~~ is necessary and proper."

25 Sec. 26. G.S. 84-37 reads as rewritten:

26 **"§ 84-37. State Bar may investigate and enjoin unauthorized practice.**

27 (a) The ~~council~~ Council or any committee appointed by it for that purpose may
28 inquire into and investigate any charges or complaints of unauthorized or unlawful
29 practice of law. The ~~council~~ Council or any committee of its members appointed for that
30 purpose may inquire into and investigate any charges or complaints of unauthorized or
31 unlawful practice of law. The ~~council~~ Council may bring or cause to be brought and
32 maintain in the name of the North Carolina State Bar an action or actions, upon
33 information or upon the complaint of any ~~private person or of any bar association~~ against
34 ~~any person, partnership, corporation or association and any employee, agent, director, or officer~~
35 ~~thereof who~~ entity against any person or entity that engages in rendering any legal service
36 or makes it a practice or business to render legal services which are unauthorized or
37 prohibited by law or statutes relative thereto. No bond for cost shall be required in ~~such~~
38 the proceeding.

39 (b) In an action brought under this section the final judgment if in favor of the
40 plaintiff shall perpetually restrain the defendant or defendants from the commission or
41 continuance of the act or acts complained of. A temporary injunction to restrain the
42 commission or continuance thereof may be granted upon proof or by affidavit, that the
43 defendant or defendants have violated any of the laws or statutes applicable to

1 unauthorized or unlawful practice of law. The provisions of statute or rules relating
2 generally to injunctions as provisional remedies in actions shall apply to ~~such~~a temporary
3 injunction and the proceedings thereunder.

4 (c) The venue for actions brought under this section shall be the superior court of
5 any county in which ~~such~~the acts constituting unauthorized or unlawful practice of law
6 are alleged to have been committed or in which there appear reasonable grounds that they
7 will be committed or in the county where the defendants in ~~such~~the action ~~reside~~reside
8 or in Wake County.

9 (d) The plaintiff in ~~such~~the action shall be entitled to examination of the adverse
10 party and witnesses before filing complaint and before trial in the same manner as
11 provided by law for the examination of parties.

12 (e) This section shall not repeal or curtail any remedy now provided in cases of
13 unauthorized or unlawful practice of law, and nothing contained herein shall be construed
14 as disabling or abridging the inherent powers of the court in ~~such~~these matters.

15 (f) The Council or its duly appointed committee has the authority to issue advisory
16 opinions in response to inquiries from members or the public regarding whether
17 contemplated conduct would constitute the unauthorized practice of law."

18 Sec. 27. This act becomes effective October 1, 1995, and applies to orders of
19 disbarment entered on or after that date and disciplinary proceedings based upon
20 convictions of offenses committed on or after that date. Section 25 applies to dues and
21 fees for years beginning with 1996.
