S 1 SENATE BILL 174 Short Title: Aerial Application of Pesticides. (Public) Sponsors: Senators Jordan and Plexico. Referred to: Agriculture/Environment/Natural Resources. February 9, 1995 A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT TO PROHIBIT THE AERIAL APPLICATION OF PESTICIDES WITHIN THREE HUNDRED FEET OF A RESIDENCE AND TO PROHIBIT THE AERIAL APPLICATION OF PESTICIDES WITHOUT NOTIFYING OCCUPANTS OF NEARBY BUILDINGS TWENTY-FOUR HOURS BEFORE THE APPLICATION. The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts: Section 1. G.S. 143-443(b) reads as rewritten: It shall be unlawful: "(b) For any person to detach, alter, deface, or destroy, in whole or in part, (1) any label or labeling provided for in this Part or regulations promulgated hereunder, or to add any substance to, or take any substance from a pesticide in a manner that may defeat the purpose of this Part; For any person to use for his own advantage or to reveal, other than to (2) the Board or proper officials or employees of the State or federal government or to the courts of this State in response to a subpoena, or to physicians, or in emergencies to pharmacists and other qualified persons, for use in the preparation of antidotes, any information relative

to formulas of products acquired by authority of G.S. 143-442.

For any person to use any pesticide in a manner inconsistent with its 1 (3) 2 labeling. 3 (4) For any person who contracts for the aerial application of a pesticide to 4 permit the application of any pesticide that is designated on its labeling 5 as toxic to bees without first notifying, based on available listings, the 6 owner or operator of any apiary registered under the North Carolina Bee 7 and Honey Act of 1977 that is within a distance designated by the 8 Pesticide Board as necessary and appropriate to prevent damage or 9 injury. 10 (5) For any person to distribute, sell or offer for sale any restricted use pesticide to any dealer who does not hold a valid North Carolina 11 12 Pesticide Dealer License. 13 (6) For any person to engage in the aerial application of pesticides within 14 300 feet of a residence. The Board may adopt rules that provide for a larger buffer zone if the Board determines a larger buffer zone is needed 15 to protect public health. 16 17 (7) For any person to engage in the aerial application of pesticides of any site without notifying occupants of schools, hospitals, nursing homes, 18 churches, businesses, residences, or any other building used by humans 19 within one-half mile of the site at least 24 hours before the aerial 20 application." 21 Sec. 2. This act becomes effective October 1, 1995, and applies to any aerial 22

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
