5	Sectio	on 1. G.S. 143-215.10C is amended by adding a new subsection to read:
6	"(<u>a1)</u> <u>The</u>	general permits for animal operations shall not require any of the
7	following:	
8	<u>(1)</u>	That application of animal waste onto land used to grow crops for direct
9		human consumption be prohibited within any specified time period
10		prior to or during the planting of the crop, during the growing season,
11		or, in the case of fruit trees, prior to breaking dormancy.
12	<u>(2)</u>	That application of animal waste onto land used to grow fiber or food
13		crops for direct human consumption that undergo further processing be
14		prohibited within any specified time period prior to the harvesting of the
15		<u>crop.</u>
16	<u>(3)</u>	That animal waste be incorporated into the soil within any specified
17		time period after it is applied onto bare soil.
18	<u>(4)</u>	That waste application and handling equipment be maintained on site,
19		when it is provided by the owner or operator.

1	(5) That inspection of a waste collection, treatment, storage, or transmission
2	structure be performed more frequently than annually, when the
3	structure is under the control of the owner or operator.
4	(6) That records be maintained of maintenance and repairs of a waste
5	collection, treatment, storage, or transmission structure, when the
6	structure is under the control of the owner or operator.
7	(7) That repairs of a waste treatment, storage, or transmission structure be
8	approved by a technical specialist."
9	Section 2. This act is effective when it becomes law.
