2 AN ACT TO EXTEND THE SUNSET ON BAD CHECK PILOT PROGRAMS AND
3 TO ADD BRUNSWICK AND BLADEN COUNTIES TO THE BAD CHECK
4 PILOT PROGRAM.

5 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

6 Section 1. Subsection (e) of Section 18.22 of S.L. 1997-443, as amended by
7 Section 16.3 of S.L. 1998-212, reads as rewritten:

8 "(e) This section becomes effective October 1, 1997, and expires June 30, ~~1999-~~
9 2000."

10 Section 2. Subsection (d) of Section 18.22 of S.L. 1997-443, as amended by
11 Section 16.3 of S.L. 1998-212 and Section 21 of S.L. 1998-217, reads as rewritten:

12 "(d) This section applies only to Bladen, Brunswick, Columbus, Durham,
13 Rockingham, and Wake Counties."

14 Section 3. There is appropriated from the General Fund to the Judicial
15 Department the sum of two hundred sixty-seven thousand seven hundred ninety-four
16 dollars (\$267,794) for the 1999-2000 fiscal year to continue the bad check collection pilot
17 programs in Columbus, Durham, Rockingham, and Wake Counties as established in
18 Section 18.22 of S.L. 1997-443, as amended by Section 16.3 of S.L. 1998-212, and to
19 establish bad check collection pilot programs in Bladen and Brunswick Counties.

1 Section 4. The Administrative Office of the Courts shall report by May 1,
2 2000, to the Chairs of the Senate and House Appropriations Committees and the Chairs
3 of the Senate and House Appropriations Subcommittees on Justice and Public Safety on
4 the implementation of the programs authorized by this act, including their effectiveness
5 in assisting the recipients of worthless checks in obtaining restitution and the amount of
6 time saved in prosecuting worthless check cases.

7 Section 5. Section 1 of this act becomes effective June 30, 1999. The
8 remainder of this act becomes effective July 1, 1999.
