27 28 PART II. STATUTORY AND SESSION LAW CHANGES

29 30 –STUDY COMMISSION ON THE FUTURE OF ELECTRIC SERVICE IN NORTH 31 CAROLINA

32 Section 2.1. Section 1 of S.L. 1997-40, as amended by S.L. 1999-122, reads as
33 rewritten:

34 "Section 1. The Study Commission on the Future of Electric Service in North
35 Carolina is created. The Commission shall consist of ~~29~~30 voting members as follows:

- 36 (1) Nine members of the Senate to be appointed by the President Pro
37 Tempore of the Senate;
- 38 (2) Nine members of the House of Representatives to be appointed by the
39 Speaker of the House of Representatives;
- 40 (3) The Chief Executive Officer of the North Carolina Electric Membership
41 Corporation or the Chief Executive Officer's designee;
- 42 (4) The Chief Executive Officer of ElectriCities of North Carolina or the
43 Chief Executive Officer's designee;

- 1 (5) The Chief Executive Officer of Duke Power Company or the Chief
2 Executive Officer's designee;
- 3 (6) The Chief Executive Officer of Carolina Power and Light Company or
4 the Chief Executive Officer's designee;
- 5 (6a) The Chief Executive Officer of North Carolina Power Company or the
6 Chief Executive Officer's designee;
- 7 (7) Two residential consumers of electricity, one to be appointed by the
8 President Pro Tempore of the Senate and one to be appointed by the
9 Speaker of the House of Representatives;
- 10 (8) One commercial consumer of electricity to be appointed by the
11 President Pro Tempore of the Senate;
- 12 (9) Two industrial consumers of electricity, one to be appointed by the
13 Speaker of the House of Representatives and one to be appointed by the
14 President Pro Tempore of the Senate;
- 15 (10) One member of the environmental community to be appointed by the
16 Governor; and
- 17 (11) One person representing a nationwide electric power marketer to be
18 appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives.

19 The President Pro Tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of
20 Representatives shall each designate a cochair from the General Assembly membership
21 serving on the Commission. The Commission shall meet upon the call of the cochairs. A
22 majority of the Commission shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business."
23

24 –NORTH CAROLINA TAX POLICY COMMISSION

25 Section 2.2. Section 3.2 of S.L. 1999-395 reads as rewritten:

26 "Section 3.2. Membership. – The Commission shall consist of ~~15~~17 members who
27 shall represent, insofar as practicable, the diverse interests and geographic regions of the
28 State and shall include individuals with expertise in tax policy, tax administration, and
29 professional tax practice.

30 The Speaker of the House of Representatives shall appoint ~~five~~six members, as
31 follows: ~~two~~three members of the General Assembly, one individual nominated by the
32 North Carolina League of Municipalities, one individual who represents business
33 taxpayers, and one public member.

34 The President Pro Tempore of the Senate shall appoint ~~five~~six members, as follows:
35 ~~two~~three members of the General Assembly, one individual nominated by the North
36 Carolina Association of County Commissioners, one individual who represents
37 nonbusiness taxpayers, and one public member.

38 The Governor shall appoint five members, as follows: one individual who represents
39 tax practitioners, one individual who represents nonprofit, charitable organizations, one
40 individual who has demonstrated leadership and expertise in tax policy, one individual
41 who represents senior citizens and one individual who represents small business
42 taxpayers.

1 Appointments to the Commission shall be made no later than August 31, ~~1999-2000~~.
2 Vacancies shall be filled by the original appointing authority."

3
4 **–PRIVATE PROTECTIVE SERVICES BOARD**

5 Section 2.3. G.S. 74C-4(b) reads as rewritten:

6 "(b) The Board shall consist of ~~40-14~~ members: the Attorney General or his
7 designated representative, two persons appointed by the Attorney General, one person
8 appointed by the Governor, ~~three-five~~ persons appointed by the General Assembly upon
9 the recommendation of the President Pro Tempore of the Senate, and ~~three-five~~ persons
10 appointed by the General Assembly upon the recommendation of the Speaker of the
11 House of Representatives. All appointments by the General Assembly shall be subject to
12 the provisions of G.S. 120-121, and vacancies in the positions filled by those
13 appointments shall be filled pursuant to G.S. 120-122. One of those persons appointed by
14 the General Assembly upon the recommendation of the President Pro Tempore of the
15 Senate and all ~~three-five~~ persons appointed by the General Assembly upon the
16 recommendation of the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall be licensees under
17 this Chapter; all other appointees may not be licensees of the Board nor licensed by the
18 Board while serving as Board members. All persons appointed shall serve terms of three
19 years. With the exception of the Attorney General or his designated representative, no
20 person shall serve more than eight consecutive years on the Board, including years of
21 service prior and subsequent to July 1, 1983. Board members may continue to serve until
22 their successors have been appointed."

23
24 **–ROANOKE ISLAND COMMISSION**

25 Section 2.4. G.S. 143B-131.6(i) reads as rewritten:

26 "(i) The Commission shall make its recommendations by ~~September-March~~ March 15 of
27 each year that terms expire for appointments for terms commencing ~~November-July~~ July 1 of
28 that year; provided the initial appointments for terms commencing October 1, 1994, shall
29 be made upon recommendation of the Roanoke Island Historical Association."

30
31 **–CENTENNIAL AUTHORITY**

32 Section 2.5. G.S. 160A-480.3(b) reads as rewritten:

33 "(b) Membership. – An authority shall have eight or ~~17-19~~ members. Members shall
34 be chosen for terms as follows:

35 (1) Four shall be appointed by the General Assembly upon the
36 recommendation of the Speaker of the House of Representatives in
37 accordance with G.S. 120-121, at least one of whom shall be a resident
38 of the territorial jurisdiction of the authority, and at least one other of
39 whom shall have been recommended by the board of trustees of the
40 constituent institution of The University of North Carolina whose main
41 campus is located within the county;

42 (2) Four shall be appointed by the General Assembly upon the
43 recommendation of the President Pro Tempore of the Senate in

- 1 accordance with G.S. 120-121, at least one of whom shall be a resident
2 of the territorial jurisdiction of the authority, and at least one other of
3 whom shall have been recommended by the Board of Trustees of the
4 constituent institution of The University of North Carolina whose main
5 campus is located within the county; and
- 6 (3) If the territorial jurisdiction of the authority is a county where the main
7 campus of a constituent institution of The University of North Carolina
8 is located, then:
- 9 a. Four members shall be appointed by the board of commissioners
10 of that county, one of whom at the time of appointment is a
11 resident of the municipality with the second largest population in
12 the county, according to the most recent decennial federal
13 census;
- 14 b. Four members shall be appointed by the city council of the city
15 with the largest population in the county, according to the most
16 recent decennial federal census;
- 17 c. ~~One member~~ Two members shall be appointed jointly by the
18 mayors of all the cities in that county.
- 19 d. The Chancellor of the main campus of a constituent institution of
20 The University of North Carolina within the county, or the
21 Chancellor's designee.

22 Beginning January 1, 1999, a majority of any executive committee, or other
23 committee however termed having supervisory or management authority over the facility
24 to be constructed by the authority, shall consist of authority members appointed under
25 ~~this subdivision.~~ subsection.

26 Neither the board of commissioners nor the city council may appoint a member of its
27 board to serve on the authority.

28 Two of the initial appointments under subdivision (1) of this subsection, two of
29 the initial appointments under subdivision (2) of this subsection, one of the initial
30 appointments under subdivision (3)a. of this subsection, and one of the initial
31 appointments under subdivision (3)b. of this section shall be for terms expiring July 1 of
32 the second year after the year in which the authority is created. The remaining initial
33 appointments shall be for terms expiring July 1 of the fourth year after the year in which
34 the authority is created. The third member appointed by the board of commissioners shall
35 serve a term beginning January 1, 1999, and expiring July 1, 2001, and the fourth
36 member appointed by the board of commissioners shall serve a term beginning January 1,
37 1999, and expiring July 1, 2003. The third member appointed by the city council shall
38 serve a term beginning January 1, 1999, and expiring July 1, 2001, and the fourth
39 member appointed by the city council shall serve a term beginning January 1, 1999, and
40 expiring July 1, 2003. Of the two appointments made by the General Assembly in 1999
41 and quadrennially thereafter upon the recommendation of the Speaker of the House of
42 Representatives, one shall be the person recommended by the board of trustees of the
43 constituent institution of The University of North Carolina whose main campus is located

1 within the county. Of the two appointments made by the General Assembly in 1999 and
2 quadrennially thereafter upon the recommendation of the President Pro Tempore of the
3 Senate, one shall be the person recommended by the board of trustees of the constituent
4 institution of The University of North Carolina whose main campus is located within the
5 county. The second member appointed under sub-subdivision (3)c. of this section shall
6 serve an initial term expiring July 1, 2003. Successors shall be appointed in the same
7 manner for four-year terms. A member may be removed by the appointing authority for
8 cause. Vacancies occurring in the membership of the authority shall be filled by the
9 remaining members."

11 –NORTH CAROLINA REAL ESTATE COMMISSION

12 Section 2.6.(a) Section 6 of S.L. 1999-405 reads as rewritten:

13 "Section 6. Upon the recommendation of the Speaker of the House of
14 Representatives, William Lackey of Mecklenburg County is appointed to the North
15 Carolina Real Estate Commission for a term expiring ~~June 30, 2002.~~ July 31, 2002."

16 Section 2.6.(b) Subsection 3.4(b) of S.L. 1999-431 reads as rewritten:

17 "Section 3.4.(b) Appointments of the initial members authorized by this section are
18 for terms expiring ~~June 30, 2002.~~ July 31, 2002."

19 Section 2.6.(c) The term of Raymond A. Bass, Jr. to the North Carolina Real Estate
20 Commission is hereby extended to July 31, 2004.

21
22 –STATE BOARD OF CHIROPRACTIC EXAMINERS

23 Section 2.7.(a). G.S. 90-139 reads as rewritten:

24 "**§ 90-139. Creation and membership of Board of Examiners.**

25 (a) The State Board of Chiropractic Examiners is created to consist of eight
26 members appointed by the ~~Governor,~~ Governor and General Assembly. ~~Seven~~ Six of the
27 members shall be practicing doctors of chiropractic, who are residents of this State and
28 who have actively practiced chiropractic in the State for at least eight consecutive years
29 immediately preceding their appointments; ~~five~~ four of these ~~seven~~ six members shall be
30 appointed by the Governor, and two by the General Assembly in accordance with G.S.
31 120-121, one each upon the recommendation of the President Pro Tempore of the Senate
32 and the Speaker of the House of Representatives. No more than three members of the
33 Board may be graduates of the same college or school of chiropractic. The other ~~member~~
34 two members shall be ~~a person~~ persons chosen by the Governor to represent the public at
35 large. The public ~~member~~ members shall not be ~~a health care provider~~ providers nor the
36 ~~spouse~~ spouses of ~~a health care provider~~ providers. For purposes of Board membership,
37 "health care provider" means any licensed health care professional and any agent or
38 employee of any health care institution, health care insurer, health care professional
39 school, or a member of any allied health profession. For purposes of this section, a person
40 enrolled in a program to prepare him to be a licensed health care professional or an allied
41 health professional shall be deemed a health care provider. For purposes of this section,
42 any person with significant financial interest in a health service or profession is not a
43 public member."

1 Section 2.7.(b). This section is effective when it becomes law and shall apply
2 to the next appointment by the Governor to replace a member who is a practicing doctor
3 of chiropractic.
