A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

**AN ACT TO APPOINT PERSONS TO VARIOUS PUBLIC OFFICES UPON THE
RECOMMENDATION OF THE PRESIDENT PRO TEMPORE OF THE SENATE
OR THE SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, AND TO MAKE
CHANGES IN STATUTES RELATING TO APPOINTMENTS TO PUBLIC
OFFICE.**

Whereas, G.S. 120-121 authorizes the General Assembly to make certain appointments to public offices upon the recommendation of the President Pro Tempore of the Senate; and

Whereas, the President Pro Tempore of the Senate has made recommendations;

Whereas, G.S. 120-121 authorizes the General Assembly to make certain appointments to public offices upon the recommendation of the Speaker of the House of Representatives; and

Whereas, the Speaker of the House of Representatives has made recommendations; Now, therefore,

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

25 **– ROANOKE ISLAND HISTORICAL ASSOCIATION**

30 The members appointed to the First Flight Centennial Commission shall be chosen

34 development of the fields of aeronautics or aerospace science, or who have demonstrated
35 a commitment to serving the public."

36 Section 3.2.(b) The initial members appointed under this section shall serve

39 –STATE-OWNED RAILROADS

40 Section 3.3.(a) G.S. 124-6(b) reads as rewritten:

41 "(b) Notwithstanding subsection (a) of this section, for any railroad company
42 organized as a corporation in which the State is the owner of all the voting stock and
43 which has trackage in more than two counties, ~~five~~seven of the members of the Board of

1 Directors shall be appointed by the Governor, ~~two~~three of the members of the Board of
2 Directors shall be appointed by the General Assembly upon the recommendation of the
3 Speaker of the House of Representatives in accordance with G.S. 120-121, and ~~two~~three
4 of the members of the Board of Directors shall be appointed by the General Assembly
5 upon the recommendation of the President Pro Tempore of the Senate in accordance with
6 G.S. 120-121. ~~Of the Governor's five appointments, three shall be either an investment banker,
7 a person with railroad management experience, a person on an economic development
8 commission whose region contains track of the company, or an attorney with corporate
9 experience. The remaining two shall be at large members. The Speaker of the House of
10 Representatives shall recommend two at large members. The President Pro Tempore of the
11 Senate shall recommend two at large members.~~The Board of Directors shall consist of ~~nine~~
12 13 members. Of the initial members appointed by the Governor, three shall be appointed
13 for terms of four years and ~~two~~four shall be appointed for terms of two years. Of the
14 initial members recommended to the General Assembly by the Speaker of the House of
15 Representatives, ~~one~~two shall be appointed for a ~~term~~terms of four years and one shall be
16 appointed for a term of two years. Of the initial members recommended to the General
17 Assembly by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate, ~~one~~two shall be appointed for a
18 ~~term~~terms of four years and one shall be appointed for a term of two years. Thereafter all
19 Board members shall serve four-year terms. The Board shall elect the chairman from
20 among its membership."

21 Section 3.3.(b) This section becomes effective when the railroad company
22 changes its articles of incorporation to increase the size of the board.

24 –NORTH CAROLINA REAL ESTATE COMMISSION

25 Section 3.4.(a) G.S. 93A-3(a) reads as rewritten:

26 "(a) There is hereby created the North Carolina Real Estate Commission,
27 hereinafter called the Commission. The Commission shall consist of nine members,
28 seven members to be appointed by the ~~Governor~~Governor, one member to be appointed
29 by the General Assembly upon the recommendation of the President Pro Tempore of the
30 Senate in accordance with G.S. 120-121, and one member to be appointed by the General
31 Assembly upon the recommendation of the President Pro Tempore of the Senate in

43 under G.S. 120-122."

2 are for terms expiring June 30, 2002.

4 --JOINT LEGISLATIVE COMMISSION ON GOVERNMENTAL OPERATIONS

5 Section 3.5.(a) G.S. 120-74 reads as rewritten:

6 "**§ 120-74. Appointment of members; terms of office.**

7 The Commission shall consist of ~~30~~34 members. The President pro tempore of the
8 Senate, the Speaker pro tempore of the House, and the Majority Leader of the Senate and
9 the Speaker of the House shall serve as ex officio members of the Commission. The
10 Speaker of the House of Representatives shall appoint ~~13~~15 members from the House.
11 The President pro tempore of the Senate shall appoint ~~13~~15 members from the Senate.
12 Vacancies created by resignation or otherwise shall be filled by the original appointing
13 authority. Members shall serve two-year terms beginning and ending on January 15 of the
14 odd-numbered years, ~~except that initial appointments shall begin on July 1, 1975.~~ years.
15 Members shall not be disqualified from completing a term of service on the Commission
16 because they fail to run or are defeated for reelection. Resignation or removal from the
17 General Assembly shall constitute resignation or removal from membership on the
18 Commission. ~~The terms of the initial members of the Commission shall expire January 15,~~
19 ~~1977."~~

20 Section 3.5.(b) The initial terms of the four additional members of the Joint
21 Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations that are added to the Commission
22 in subsection (a) of this section shall begin on appointment.

24 --LEGISLATIVE SERVICES COMMISSION

25 Section 3.6.(a) G.S. 120-31(a) reads as rewritten:

26 "(a) The Legislative Services Commission shall consist of the President pro
27 tempore of the Senate, ~~six~~seven Senators appointed by the President pro tempore of the
28 Senate, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and ~~six~~seven Representatives
29 appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives. The President pro tempore of
30 the Senate, and the Speaker of the House shall serve until the selection and qualification
31 of their respective successors as officers of the General Assembly. The initial appointive
32 members shall be appointed after the date of ratification of this Article and each shall
33 serve for the remainder of his elective term of office and until his successor is appointed
34 or until he ceases to be a member of the General Assembly, whichever occurs first. A
35 vacancy in one of the appointive positions shall be filled in the same manner that the
36 vacated position was originally filled, and the person so appointed shall serve for the

38 of Speaker becomes vacated, the ~~six~~seven Representatives shall elect one of themselves
39 to perform the duties of the Speaker as required by this Article. In the event the office of
40 President pro tempore becomes vacated, the ~~six~~seven Senators shall elect one of
41 themselves to perform the duties of President pro tempore as required by this Article.
42 Members so elevated shall perform the duties required by this Article until a Speaker or a
43 President pro tempore is duly elected by the appropriate house."

1 Section 3.6.(b) The initial terms of the two additional members of the Legislative
2 Services Commission that are added to the Commission in subsection (a) of this section
3 shall begin on appointment.

5 – JOINT LEGISLATIVE EDUCATION OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE

6 Section 3.7.(a) G.S. 120-70.80 reads as rewritten:

7 **"§ 120-70.80. Creation and membership of Joint Legislative Education Oversight**
8 **Committee.**

9 The Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee is established. The Committee
10 consists of ~~18~~20 members as follows:

- 11 (1) ~~Nine~~Ten members of the Senate appointed by the President Pro
12 Tempore of the Senate, at least two of whom are members of the
13 minority party; and
- 14 (2) ~~Nine~~Ten members of the House of Representatives appointed by the
15 Speaker of the House of Representatives, at least three of whom are
16 members of the minority party.

17 Terms on the Committee are for two years and begin on the convening of the General
18 Assembly in each odd-numbered year, ~~except the terms of the initial members, which~~
19 ~~begin on appointment and end on the day of the convening of the 1991 General~~
20 ~~Assembly year.~~ Members may complete a term of service on the Committee even if they
21 do not seek reelection or are not reelected to the General Assembly, but resignation or
22 removal from service in the General Assembly constitutes resignation or removal from
23 service on the Committee.

24 A member continues to serve until his successor is appointed. A vacancy shall be
25 filled within 30 days by the officer who made the original appointment."

26 Section 3.8.(b) Terms of the additional members authorized by this section
27 expire upon convening of the 2001 Regular Session of the General Assembly.

29 –STATE BOARD OF CHIROPRACTIC EXAMINERS

30 Section 3.9. G.S. 90-139 reads as rewritten:

31 **"§ 90-139. Creation and membership of Board of Examiners.**

32 (a) The State Board of Chiropractic Examiners is created to consist of ~~seven~~eight
33 members appointed by the Governor, and General Assembly. ~~Six~~Seven of the members
34 shall be practicing doctors of chiropractic, who are residents of this State and who have
35 actively practiced chiropractic in the State for at least eight consecutive years
36 immediately preceding their appointments; four of these ~~six~~seven members shall be
37 appointed by the Governor, and two by the General Assembly in accordance with G.S.
38 120-121, one each upon the recommendation of the President Pro Tempore of the Senate
39 and the Speaker of the House of Representatives. No more than three members of the
40 Board may be graduates of the same college or school of chiropractic. The other member
41 shall be a person chosen by the Governor to represent the public at large. The public
42 member shall not be a health care provider nor the spouse of a health care provider. For
43 purposes of Board membership, "health care provider" means any licensed health care

1 professional and any agent or employee of any health care institution, health care insurer,
2 health care professional school, or a member of any allied health profession. For purposes
3 of this section, a person enrolled in a program to prepare him to be a licensed health care
4 professional or an allied health professional shall be deemed a health care provider. For
5 purposes of this section, any person with significant financial interest in a health service
6 or profession is not a public member."

7 Section 4. Unless otherwise provided for in this act, appointments are for
8 terms to begin when this bill becomes law.

9 Section 5. This act is effective when it becomes law.
