1                                   A BILL TO BE ENTITLED  
2 AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE FUNDS FOR THE LOCAL JUVENILE CRIME  
3 PREVENTION COUNCILS.

4           Whereas, in response to concerns about juvenile crime, the General Assembly  
5 enacted the Juvenile Justice Reform Act of 1998, which established Juvenile Crime  
6 Prevention Councils in every county of the State for the purpose of developing  
7 community-based alternatives to the commitment of juveniles in State and local  
8 facilities and for providing community-based delinquency and substance abuse  
9 prevention strategies and programs; and

10           Whereas, the General Assembly, by establishing the Juvenile Crime  
11 Prevention Councils, accorded greater emphasis and resources to innovative and  
12 creative community strategies, solutions, and services to prevent juveniles who are at  
13 risk from becoming undisciplined and delinquent; and

14           Whereas, a majority of the juveniles adjudicated undisciplined or delinquent  
15 in this State suffer from mental illness or drug dependency or addiction; and

16           Whereas, for the last five years, an average of 63% of the juveniles  
17 committed to the Department of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention have been  
18 African-Americans though they comprise only 26% of the total North Carolina youth  
19 population; and

20           Whereas, since the enactment of the Juvenile Justice Reform Act in 1998, the  
21 State has had budget deficits which have caused the General Assembly to reduce  
22 funding for the Juvenile Crime Prevention Councils and for communities attempting to  
23 provide much-needed intervention and prevention services for juveniles who are at risk  
24 of becoming undisciplined or delinquent; and

25           Whereas, the intent and potentially positive impact of the Juvenile Justice  
26 Reform Act has been greatly diminished due to the reduction in funding of the Councils  
27 since 1998; Now, therefore,

28 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

1           **SECTION 1.** There is appropriated from the General Fund to the  
2 Department of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention the sum of two million  
3 dollars (\$2,000,000) for the 2004-2005 fiscal year to be allocated to the local Juvenile  
4 Crime Prevention Councils. The funds shall be allocated based on the population of the  
5 counties served by the Councils and shall be used to continue to implement juvenile  
6 justice reform and to provide for early intervention and prevention of juvenile crime and  
7 delinquency.

8           **SECTION 2.** This act becomes effective July 1, 2004.
