1	A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
2	AN ACT TO ESTABLISH A STREAMLINED PROGRAM FOR PERMITTING THE
3	MANAGEMENT OF WINERY WASTEWATER.
4	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:
5	SECTION 1. The General Assembly finds that it is desirable to promote and
6	increase wine production in North Carolina while ensuring the protection of the water
7	resources of the State. It is the intention of the General Assembly to promote a
8	cooperative and coordinated approach among the agencies of the State in the
9	management of winery wastewater, with an emphasis on reasonable regulatory controls
10	so as to minimize regulatory burdens, as appropriate, and maximize the protection of the
11	quality of the waters and the health of the citizens of the State.
12	SECTION 2. The Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services and
13	the Department of Environment and Natural Resources shall jointly prepare technical
14	assistance information on the management of winery cleaning and process wastewater.
15	This information shall emphasize local means of addressing winery cleaning and
16	process wastewater management, including both on-site subsurface wastewater systems,
17	permitted by county health departments, and connection to publicly owned treatment
18	works. Furthermore, the Department of Environment and Natural Resources, in
19	consultation with the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, shall develop
20	design criteria for the management of winery cleaning and process wastewater through
21	nondischarge land application systems. The technical assistance information shall be
22	completed by April 1, 2004, and shall be made available to the public. The design
23	criteria shall be completed by July 1, 2004.
24	SECTION 3. G.S. 143-215.1 is amended by adding two new subsections to
25	read:
26	"(d2) A wastewater management system for the treatment and disposal of cleaning
27	and process wastewater from a winery that produces 200 or more gallons of wine per

28 year that cannot dispose of its wastewater through an on-site subsurface wastewater

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1	system or connect to a publicly owned treatment works, and that would otherwise be				
2	permitted	under	subsection (d) of this section, may be permitted in accordance with		
3	subsection	1 (d) of	f this section provided all of the following conditions are met:		
4		<u>(1)</u>	The use of treated winery cleaning and process wastewater for		
5			irrigation is restricted to vineyards, pastures, or landscape irrigation		
6			areas under the ownership or control of the winery owner and		
7			designated in the permit.		
8		(2)	Treated winery cleaning and process wastewater is applied so that it		
9			does not exceed the needs of the vegetation or the absorptive capacity		
10			of the land.		
11		(3)	Treated winery cleaning and process wastewater is applied so that		
12			ponding or runoff of the wastewater does not occur.		
13		(4)	Measures are taken to prevent breeding of insects and creation of other		
14			hazards to public health.		
15		(5)	For a land area onto which treated winery cleaning and process		
16			wastewater is applied, setbacks from a property boundary shall not be		
17			required if the wastewater is applied so that it does not drift off-site of		
18			the property owned by the winery and signs are posted every 200 yards		
19			along the winery property boundary stating, "Winery cleaning and		
20			process wastewater being reused to irrigate lands."		
21		(6)	For a winery that employs a drip irrigation disposal system and does		
22			not comply with the requirements of subdivision (5) of this subsection,		
23			the drip irrigation disposal system shall be located at least 50 feet from		
24			any property boundary, unless a waiver is granted by the owner of the		
25			adjoining property for a reduction in the setback.		
26		(7)	For a winery that employs a spray irrigation disposal system and does		
27			not comply with the requirements of subdivision (5) of this subsection,		
28			the spray irrigation disposal system shall be located at least 150 feet		
29			from any property boundary, unless a waiver is granted by the owner		
30			of the adjoining property for a reduction of setback.		
31		(8)	Notwithstanding any other subdivision of this subsection, the use of		
32			treated winery cleaning and process wastewater for irrigation shall not		
33			occur within 100 feet of any drinking water source or surface water.		
34		(9)	Notwithstanding any other subdivision of this subsection, an		
35			impoundment of treated winery cleaning and process wastewater shall		
36			not be located within 100 feet of any drinking water source or surface		
37			water.		
38	(d3)	A was	stewater management system for the treatment and disposal of cleaning		
39			tewater from a winery that produces less than 200 gallons of wine per		
40	-		emed permitted provided all of the following conditions are met:		
41	•	(1)	No winery cleaning and process wastewater is discharged to surface		
42			waters.		
43		(2)	The winery cleaning and process wastewater does not degrade the		
44			groundwater of the State.
