TO APPI The General SI Commission SI members, as (1)	The President Pro Tempore of the Senate shall appoint five members, three of whom shall be members of the Senate, one of whom shall be an individual infected with hepatitis C, and one of whom shall be a representative of a North Carolina nonprofit organization working on hepatitis C issues.
(2)	The Speaker of the House of Representatives shall appoint five members, three of whom shall be members of the House of Representatives, one of whom shall be a hepatologist, and one of whom shall have expertise in hepatitis C/HIV coinfection, as recommended by the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Public Health.

SECTION 1.(c) Duties. – The Commission shall study the following:

- 1 (1) Historical and current information about the scope and nature of the spread of hepatitis in North Carolina.
 - (2) Statewide and local practices and efforts by both the public and private sectors regarding the prevention, testing, diagnosis, and treatment of hepatitis C.
 - (3) Education levels of patients, health care providers, policymakers, and the general public about hepatitis C, including the availability of hepatitis C counseling, screening, education, treatment, harm reduction, and prevention efforts.
 - (4) Awareness among persons at high risk for hepatitis C as well as police officers, firefighters, persons employed by correctional facilities, emergency response personnel, health care professionals, persons employed in primary care settings or health care facilities, and other persons who come into contact with high-risk groups.
 - (5) Information about coinfection with hepatitis C and HIV and the implications of coinfection for HIV/AIDS treatment.
 - (6) Infection rates and screening and treatment issues in high-risk populations, including veterans, Correction Department inmates, and substance abusers.
 - (7) Existing hepatitis C support services in the community and the need for improving the quality and accessibility of these services.

SECTION 1.(d) Reports. – The Commission shall submit a final written report of its findings and recommendations to the General Assembly not later than the convening of the 2007 General Assembly, Regular Session 2008. The Commission may submit a progress report to the 2007 General Assembly upon its convening. The reports shall also include legislative proposals necessary to implement the Commission's recommendations and an analysis of the fiscal impact of each recommendation. The Commission shall terminate upon the earlier of the filing of its final report or upon the convening of the 2009 General Assembly.

SECTION 1.(e) Expenses of members. – Members of the Commission shall be paid per diem, subsistence, and travel expenses, as follows:

- (1) Commission members who are members of the General Assembly shall be paid in accordance with G.S. 120-3.1.
- (2) Commission members who are officials or employees of the State or local government agencies shall be paid in accordance with G.S. 138-6.
- (3) All other Commission members shall be paid in accordance with G.S. 138-5.

SECTION 1.(f) Cochairs; meetings. – The Speaker of the House of Representatives shall appoint a cochair, and the President Pro Tempore of the Senate shall appoint a cochair for the Commission from their respective appointees. The Commission shall meet upon the call of the chairs. A majority of the Commission members shall constitute a quorum. The Commission may meet during a regular or special session of the General Assembly, subject to the approval of the President Pro

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Tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives. The Legislative Services Commission may provide meeting space to the Commission in the State Legislative Building or in the Legislative Office Building.

SECTION 1.(g) Staff. – With the prior approval of the Legislative Services Commission, the Legislative Services Officer shall assign professional staff to assist in the work of the Commission.

SECTION 1.(h) Cooperation by government agencies. – The Commission may call upon any department, agency, institution, or officer of the State or any political subdivision of the State for facilities, data, or other assistance. All State departments and agencies, local governments, and their subdivisions shall cooperate with the Commission and, upon request, shall furnish the Commission and its staff any information in their possession or available to them.

SECTION 2. From funds appropriated to the General Assembly, the Legislative Services Commission shall allocate funds for the expenses of the Commission established by this act.

SECTION 3. This act becomes effective July 1, 2006.
