## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED 1 2 AN ACT TO AMEND THE CONSTITUTION OF NORTH CAROLINA TO 3 PROHIBIT EMINENT DOMAIN FROM BEING USED FOR ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT PURPOSES. 4 5 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts: **SECTION 1.** Article 1 of the North Carolina Constitution is amended by 6 7 adding the following new section: 8 "Sec. 38. Restriction on use of eminent domain. Except by the express consent of the owner, private property may not be taken by 9 the State of North Carolina or by any local government or political subdivision for use 10 by a private entity to make a more profitable use of the property, for economic 11 development purposes, or for any other private use. In any case involving the taking of 12 private property, the State and its political subdivisions shall have the burden of 13 14 proving, by no less than clear and convincing evidence, the necessity for taking private property, the legality of the taking, and just compensation." 15 SECTION 2. The amendment set out in Section 1 of this act shall be 16 submitted to the qualified voters of the State at the statewide general election to be held 17 November 7, 2006, which election shall be conducted under the laws then governing 18 elections in the State. Ballots, voting systems, or both may be used in accordance with 19 Chapter 163 of the General Statutes. The question to be used in the voting systems and 20 21 ballots shall be: 22 "[] FOR [] AGAINST Constitutional amendment to prohibit the State of North Carolina or any local 23 government or political subdivision from taking any property by eminent domain for 24 use by a private entity to make a more profitable use of the property, for economic 25 development purposes, or for any other private use. In any case involving the taking of 26 private property, the State and its political subdivisions shall have the burden of 27

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proving, by no less than clear and convincing evidence, the necessity for taking private
property, the legality of the taking, and just compensation."

SECTION 3. If a majority of votes cast on the question are in favor of the
amendment set out in Section 1 of this act, the State Board of Elections shall certify the
amendment to the Secretary of State. The Secretary of State shall enroll the amendment
so certified among the permanent records of that office. The amendment set out in
Section 1 of this act becomes effective January 1, 2007.
SECTION 4. This act is effective when it becomes law.
