  - (3) A valid United States passport.
  - (4) A valid employee identification card containing a photograph of the voter and issued by any branch, department, agency, or entity of the United States government, this State, or any county, municipality, board, authority, or other entity of this State.
  - (5) A valid United States military identification card, provided that such identification card contains a photograph of the voter.
  - (6) A valid tribal identification card containing a photograph of the voter.
  - (b) Voting Mail-In Absentee. An individual who has registered to vote by mail on or after January 1, 2003, and has not previously voted in an election that includes a ballot item for federal office in North Carolina, in order to cast a mail-in absentee vote, shall submit with the mailed-in absentee ballot a copy of one of the following:
    - (1) A <del>copy of a current and valid photo identification.</del>
    - (2) A copy of one One of the following documents that shows the name and address of the voter: a current utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck, or other government document.
  - (a1) Special Identification Requirement for Conformity With Federal Law. An individual who registered to vote by mail after January 1, 2003, and has not previously voted in an election that includes a ballot item for federal office in North Carolina shall present to a local election official at a voting place before voting there one of the following:
    - (1) A current and valid photo identification.
    - (2) A copy of one of the following documents that shows the name and address of the voter: a current utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck, or other government document.
  - (b1) The county board of elections shall note the type of identification proof submitted by the voter under the provisions of subsection (a) (a), (a1), or (b) of this section and may dispose of the tendered copy of identification proof as soon as the type of proof is noted in the voter registration records.
  - (c) The Right to Vote Provisionally. If an individual is required under subsection (a) or (b) (a), (b), or (a1) of this section to present identification in order to vote, but that individual does not present the required identification, that individual may vote a provisional official ballot. If the voter is at the voting place, the voter may vote provisionally there without unnecessary delay. If the voter is voting by mail-in absentee ballot, the mailed ballot without the required identification shall be treated as a provisional official ballot. That provisional ballot shall be counted only if the county board of elections is able to verify identification of the voter, as provided in subsection (a), (b), or (a1) of this section, whichever applies, prior to the date of its canvass as set forth in G.S. 163-182.5(b).
  - (d) <u>Exemptions. Exemptions From Absentee or Federal-Compliance Identification. This Subsections (b) and (b1) of this section does do not apply to any of the following:</u>

An individual who registers by mail and submits as part of the (1) 1 2 registration application either of the following: 3 A copy of a current and valid photo identification. A copy of one of the following documents that shows the name 4 h. 5 and address of the voter: a current utility bill, bank statement, 6 government check, paycheck, or other government document. 7 An individual who registers by mail and submits as part of the (2) 8 registration application the individual's drivers license number or at 9 least the last four digits of the individual's social security number 10 where an election official matches either or both of the numbers submitted with an existing State identification record bearing the same 11 12 number, name, and date of birth contained in the submitted 13 registration. An individual who is entitled to vote by absentee ballot under the 14 (3) 15 Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act. 16 (4) An individual who is entitled to vote otherwise than in person under 17 section 3(b)(2)(B)(ii) of the Voting Accessibility for the Elderly and 18 Handicapped Act. An individual who is entitled to vote otherwise than in person under 19 (5) any other federal law." 20 21 **SECTION 2.** Article 14A of Chapter 163 of the General Statutes is amended 22 by adding a new section to read: 23 "§ 163-166.12A. North Carolina voter identification card. 24 Each county board of elections shall provide at least one place in the county (a) at which it shall accept applications for and issue North Carolina voter identification 25 cards to registered North Carolina voters. That card shall under State law be valid only 26 for purposes of voter identification under G.S. 163-166.12 and available only to 27 registered voters of this State. No fee shall be charged or collected for the application 28 for or issuance of a North Carolina voter identification card. 29 No individual shall be eligible for a North Carolina voter identification card if 30 (b) that individual has a valid unexpired drivers license or identification card issued under 31 32 G.S. 20-37.7. 33 The North Carolina voter identification card shall be captioned 'NORTH (c) CAROLINA VOTER IDENTIFICATION CARD' and shall contain a prominent 34 35 statement that under North Carolina law it is valid only as identification for voting purposes. The North Carolina voter identification card shall be laminated, shall contain 36 a digital color photograph of the applicant, and shall include all the following 37 38 information:

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Full legal name.

Birth date.

Sex.

Height.

Address of residence.

Date identification card was issued.

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Weight. 1 (7) 2

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- (8) Eye color.
  - (9) County where the identification card was issued, including a county number to be assigned for each county by the State Board of Elections.
  - Such other information or identification as required by rule of the State (10)Board of Elections.
- The application for a North Carolina voter identification card shall elicit the (d) information required under subsection (c) of this section and such other information as may be required by rule of the State Board of Elections. The application shall be signed and sworn to by the applicant, and any falsification or fraud in the making of the application shall constitute a felony offense under G.S. 14-209, relating to the offense of false swearing.
- (e) The county board of elections shall require presentation and verification of all the following information before issuing a North Carolina voter identification card to an individual:
  - (1) A photo identity document, except that a nonphoto identity document is acceptable if it includes both the individual's full legal name and date of birth.
  - Documentation showing the individual's date of birth. **(2)**
  - Evidence that the individual is registered to vote in this State. (3)
  - (4) Documentation showing the individual's name and address of principal residence.
- A North Carolina voter identification card shall remain valid so long as an (f) individual resides at the same address and remains qualified to vote. It shall be the duty of an individual who moves his or her residence within the State of North Carolina to surrender his or her card to the board of elections of the county of his or her new residence; and that individual may after that surrender apply for and receive a new card if that individual is otherwise eligible under this section. It shall be the duty of an individual who moves his or her residence outside the State of North Carolina or who ceases to be qualified to vote to surrender his or her card to the county board of elections by which it was issued.
- The State Board of Elections shall provide each county board of elections with the necessary equipment, forms, supplies, and training for the production of the North Carolina voter identification cards and shall maintain that equipment.
- The State Board of Elections shall adopt rules for the administration of this section. Those rules may further define or prescribe the types of documentation required under subsection (e) of this section."

**SECTION 3.** G.S. 163-82.8 is repealed.

**SECTION 4.** G.S. 163-166.7(a) reads as rewritten:

Checking Registration. – A person seeking to vote shall enter the voting enclosure through the appropriate entrance. A precinct official assigned to check registration shall at once ask the voter to state current name and residence address. address and to present an identification document in accordance with G.S. 163-166.12. The voter shall answer by stating current name and residence address. In a primary 1 2

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election, that voter shall also be asked to state, and shall state, the political party with which the voter is affiliated or, if unaffiliated, the authorizing party in which the voter wishes to vote. After examination, that official shall state whether that voter is duly registered to vote in that precinct and shall direct that voter to the voting equipment or to the official assigned to distribute official ballots. If a precinct official states that the person is duly registered, the person shall sign the pollbook, other voting record, or voter authorization document in accordance with subsection (c) of this section before voting."

## **SECTION 5.** G.S. 163-227.2(b) reads as rewritten:

Not earlier than the third Thursday before an election, in which absentee ballots are authorized, in which a voter seeks to vote and not later than 1:00 P.M. on the last Saturday before that election, the voter shall appear in person only at the office of the county board of elections, except as provided in subsection (g) of this section. A county board of elections shall conduct one-stop voting on the last Saturday before the election until 1:00 P.M. and may conduct it until 5:00 P.M. on that Saturday. That voter shall enter the voting enclosure at the board office through the appropriate entrance and shall at once state his or her name and place of residence to an authorized member or employee of the board. board and present an identification document in accordance with G.S. 163-166.12. In a primary election, the voter shall also state the political party with which the voter affiliates and in whose primary the voter desires to vote, or if the voter is an unaffiliated voter permitted to vote in the primary of a particular party under G.S. 163-119, the voter shall state the name of the authorizing political party in whose primary he wishes to vote. The board member or employee to whom the voter gives this information shall announce the name and residence of the voter in a distinct tone of voice. After examining the registration records, an employee of the board shall state whether the person seeking to vote is duly registered. If the voter is found to be registered that voter may request that the authorized member or employee of the board furnish the voter with an application form as specified in G.S. 163-227. The voter shall complete the application in the presence of the authorized member or employee of the board, and shall deliver the application to that person."

**SECTION 6.(a)** Article 14A of Chapter 163 of the General Statutes reads as rewritten:

## "§ 163-82.4A. Voter registration application form in English only, except where required by federal law.

The State Board of Elections and any county board of elections shall not print or make available the voter registration forms described in this Article in any language other than English, except to the extent doing so in another language is required by federal law."

**SECTION 6.(b)** G.S. 163-82.5 reads as rewritten:

## "§ 163-82.5. Distribution of application forms.

The Except as prohibited by G.S. 163-82.4A, the State Board of Elections shall make the forms described in G.S. 163-82.3 available for distribution through governmental and private entities, with particular emphasis on making them available for organized voter registration drives."

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1	<b>SECTION 6.(c)</b> Nothing in this section shall affect the acceptance by a
2	board of elections of an otherwise valid voter registration application submitted on a
3	form that is not in English.
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**SECTION 7.** There is appropriated from the General Fund for the 2006-2007 fiscal year the sum of eight hundred thousand dollars (\$800,000) to the State Board of Elections for the implementation of this act.

**SECTION 8.** Sections 1 through 5 of this act become effective January 1, 2007, and apply with respect to all primaries and elections held on or after that date. Section 6 of this act becomes effective October 1, 2006. Section 7 of this act becomes effective July 1, 2006. The remainder of this act is effective when it becomes law.
