

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## SENATE BILL DRS45076-LU-18A

Short Title:	Removal of Political Signs by Citizens.	(Public)
Sponsors:	Senators D. Davis, Tillman, and Hise (Primary Sponsors).	
Referred to:		

1	A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
2	AN ACT TO ALLOW ANY CITIZEN TO REMOVE A POLITICAL SIGN THAT REMAINS
3	IN A PUBLIC RIGHT-OF-WAY THIRTY DAYS AFTER THE TIME WITHIN WHICH
4	POLITICAL SIGNS ARE TO BE REMOVED.
5	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:
6	<b>SECTION 1.</b> G.S. 136-32 is amended by adding a new subsection to read:
7	"(e1) Notwithstanding subsection (e) of this section, a citizen may remove a political sign
8	that remains in a public right-of-way after 30 days from the date political signs are to be removed
9	pursuant to subsection (b) of this section. Within 72 hours of removing the political sign, the
10	citizen shall deliver the political sign to the county board of elections office in the county in
11	which the sign was located. If a citizen fails to deliver the political sign to the county board of
12	elections within the time frame required by this subsection, the citizen is subject to the penalties
13	for unlawful removal of signs under subsection (e) of this section. Upon receiving a political sign
14	pursuant to this subsection, the director of the county board of elections shall attempt to notify
15	and return the political sign to the appropriate candidate, committee, or organization's campaign.
16	However, if after 15 days attempts to notify the campaign are unsuccessful, the county board of
17	elections may dispose of the political sign as it deems appropriate."
18	<b>SECTION 2.</b> This act is effective when it becomes law and applies to the removal
19	of political signs for a primary or election held on or after that date.
