2	AN ACT TO MAKE VARIOUS CHANGES TO LAWS RELATED TO EDUCATION.
3	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

5	PART I. REPEAL CERTAIN EDUCATION REPORTS
6	SECTION 1.1. G.S. 116C-5(e) is repealed.
7	<b>SECTION 1.2.</b> Section 7.28(g) of S.L. 2007-323 is repealed.
8	SECTION 1.3. G.S. 116C-4(c) is repealed.
9	SECTION 1.4. Section 9.5(b) of S.L. 2017-57 is repealed.
10	<b>SECTION 1.5.(a)</b> G.S. 115D-5(f) reads as rewritten:
11	"(f) A community college may not offer a new program without the approval of the State
12	Board of Community Colleges except that approval shall not be required if the tuition for the
13	program will fully cover the cost of the program. If at any time tuition fails to fully cover the cost
14	of a program that falls under the exception, the program shall be discontinued unless approved
15	by the State Board of Community Colleges. If a proposed new program would serve more than
16	one community college, the State Board of Community Colleges shall perform a feasibility study
17	prior to acting on the proposal. The State Board of Community Colleges shall consider whether
18	a regional approach can be used when developing new programs and, to the extent possible, shall
19	initiate new programs on a regional basis.
20	The State Board of Community Colleges shall report collect data on an annual basis to the
21	Governor, Lieutenant Governor, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and the Joint
22	Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations, on all new programs and program
23	terminations it approved and any regionalization of programs during the year. The report shall
24	include year, including the specific reasons for which each program was terminated or approved."
25	<b>SECTION 1.5.(b)</b> Section 8.2 of S.L. 2002-126 reads as rewritten:
26	"SECTION 8.2. It is the intent of the General Assembly to increase the number of regional
27	program offerings in community colleges and to reduce duplication of programs by colleges that
28	are within reasonably close proximity to each other; therefore, the State Board of Community
29	Colleges shall review existing programs to determine which of the existing programs can be
30	offered regionally. In developing new programs, the State Board of Community Colleges shall
31	consider whether a regional approach can be used, and to the extent possible, shall initiate new
32	programs on a regional basis.

be combined with the evaluation of the Career and College Promise Program required by
G.S. 115D-5(x), and the Community Colleges System Office shall be responsible for submitting
