AN ACT, CONSISTENT WITH HOUSE BILL 966 OF THE 2019 REGULAR SESSION, TO
ENACT A BUDGET FOR THE NORTH CAROLINA COMMUNITY COLLEGE
SYSTEM; TO MAKE ADDITIONAL APPROPRIATIONS, TRANSFERS, AND
REDUCTIONS TO THE BUDGET OF THE COMMUNITY COLLEGE SYSTEM; AND
TO MAKE OTHER MODIFICATIONS RELATED TO THE OPERATIONS OF THE
COMMUNITY COLLEGE SYSTEM.

10 PART I. APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE COMMUNITY COLLEGE SYSTEM

12 INTRODUCTION

SECTION 1.1. The appropriations made in this act and S.L. 2019-209 are for maximum amounts necessary to provide the services and accomplish the purposes described in the budget for the Community College System in accordance with the State Budget Act. Savings shall be effected where the total amounts appropriated are not required to perform these services and accomplish these purposes, and the savings shall revert to the appropriate fund at the end of each fiscal year, except as otherwise provided by law.

SEC	CTION 3.1. G.S. 115D-3 reads as rewritten:	

"§ 115D-3. Community Colleges System Office; staff.staff; reorganization authority. 50

General Assembly Of North Carolina

1 (a) The Community Colleges System Office shall be a principal administrative 2 department of State government under the direction of the State Board of Community Colleges, 3 and shall be separate from the free public school system of the State, the State Board of 4 Education, and the Department of Public Instruction. The State Board has authority to adopt and 5 administer all policies, regulations, and standards which it deems necessary for the operation of 6 the System Office.

The State Board shall elect a President of the North Carolina System of Community Colleges
who shall serve as chief administrative officer of the Community Colleges System Office. The
compensation of this position shall be fixed by the State Board from funds provided by the
General Assembly in the Current Operations Appropriations Act.

11 The President shall be assisted by such professional staff members as may be deemed 12 necessary to carry out the provisions of this Chapter, who shall be elected by the State Board on 13 nomination of the President. The compensation of the staff members elected by the Board shall 14 be fixed by the State Board of Community Colleges, upon recommendation of the President of the Community College System, from funds provided in the Current Operations Appropriations 15 16 Act. These staff members shall include such officers as may be deemed desirable by the President 17 and State Board. Provision shall be made for persons of high competence and strong professional 18 experience in such areas as academic affairs, public service programs, business and financial 19 affairs, institutional studies and long-range planning, student affairs, research, legal affairs, 20 health affairs and institutional development, and for State and federal programs administered by 21 the State Board. In addition, the President shall be assisted by such other employees as may be 22 needed to carry out the provisions of this Chapter, who shall be subject to the provisions of 23 Chapter 126 of the General Statutes. The staff complement shall be established by the State Board 24 on recommendation of the President to insure that there are persons on the staff who have the 25 professional competence and experience to carry out the duties assigned and to insure that there 26 are persons on the staff who are familiar with the problems and capabilities of all of the principal 27 types of institutions represented in the system. The State Board of Community Colleges shall 28 have all other powers, duties, and responsibilities delegated to the State Board of Education 29 affecting the Community Colleges System Office not otherwise stated in this Chapter.

(b) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the President may reorganize the System
 Office in accordance with recommendations and plans submitted to and approved by the State
 Board of Community Colleges. If a reorganization is implemented pursuant to this subsection,
 including any movement of positions and funds between fund codes on a recurring basis, the
 President shall report by June 30 of the fiscal year in which the reorganization occurred to the
 Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee and the Fiscal Research Division of the
 General Assembly."

SECTION 3.2.(a) G.S. 115D-5(b) reads as rewritten:

In order to make instruction as accessible as possible to all citizens, the teaching of 41 "(b) 42 curricular courses and of noncurricular extension courses at convenient locations away from 43 institution campuses as well as on campuses is authorized and shall be encouraged. A pro rata 44 portion of the established regular tuition rate charged a full-time student shall be charged a 45 part-time student taking any curriculum course. In lieu of any tuition charge, the State Board of 46 Community Colleges shall establish a uniform registration fee, or a schedule of uniform registration fees, to be charged students enrolling in extension courses for which instruction is 47 48 financed primarily from State funds. The State Board of Community Colleges may provide by 49 general and uniform regulations for waiver of tuition and registration fees for the following:
